COUNTY TREASURER'S TAX NOTICE.

The Treasurer's office will be open for the collection of taxes for the fiscal year 1924 from Oct. 15th, 1924, to March 15th, 1925, invlusive. A penalty of 1 per cent. will be applied to all taxes not paid by Dec. 31st, 1924.

A penalty of 2 per cent. will be applied to all taxes not paid by January 31st, 1925.

A penalty of 7 per cent will be applied to all unpaid taxes from March 1st to March 15th, inclusive-after which the books close and Executions will be issued.
