It will be impossible for many farmers in this section to pay what they owe this year, but every one should make an nonest effort to pay as far as he can. If a man wants a credit, he must protect it. Credit will be needed next spring, and both merchant and farmer should treat each other justly.

Our merchants have certainly done well in the matter of holding up the cotton market here this fall. The prices paid here have been higher than at other points in this section, and the merchants of Bamberg deserve the credit for it. The consequence is that we are getting cotton from all sections, and the receipts for this season will be much larger, in proportion, than usual.

There is one farmer candidate for governor, viz: D. C. Heyward, of Walterboro, and he is a man who has never held political office of any kind before. He is no mere politician, and if he does not Chitty make a fine showing in the campaign next year, we shall be surprised. In fact, people down this way believe that the man who occupies the gubernatorial chair for the next term will have to beat Heyward and the candidate who beats him will be governor.

In 1890 Benjamin R. Tillman made great ado about the lawyers having control of State politics. It is time for Ben to start a movement in this direction again. 




