The following articles of personal property shall be valued for taxation as follows, to wit: horses, mules and asses, cattle, sheep, hogs, goats, gold and silver plate, gold and silver watches, pianos, organs, melodeons, carriages, buggies, wagons, carts, dogs, merchandise, moneys and credits, materials used in and all other personal property.
