**Attempts Her Own Life.**

MANNING, Aug. 27.—Mrs. Mamie Boseman of Alcolu endeavored to take her own life this morning by taking an overdose of laudanum, but fortunately she was found before the poison had taken sufficient effect to put her beyond recovery. Your correspondent sought to find out if possible the reason for this attempt at suicide and from the information gained it seems that some time ago this Mrs. Boseman and a Mrs. Barfield had a misunderstanding, brought about by a dog of one of the parties eating some chickens belonging to the other. They met and had a fight, Mrs. Boseman striking Mrs. Barfield with a heavy stick of some kind, whereupon Mrs. Barfield prosecuted her for assault and battery and the case was sent up to the circuit court, Mrs. Boseman giving a \$500 bond for her appearance. She has been revived but is not yet out of danger at this writing.

**Maybe a Contest.**

Mr. Hiers, of Ehrhardt, was in the city Monday and conferred with some of the prohibitionists in reference to contesting the recent dispensary election. Mr. Hiers had affidavits from a dozen or more voters at Ehrhardt stating that they were not allowed to vote but would have voted against the dispensary. H. M. Graham, Esq., was consulted as attorney, and he advised them that more evidence would have to be produced in order to make a winning fight. Those pushing the matter were to secure additional affidavits and wire Mr. Graham Tuesday afternoon to file a formal protest with the board of canvassers. As this protest was not filed, it is thought no further steps will be taken.
