Civic Association Organized.

On Friday afternoon, October 9th, the Civic Association of Bamberg met at the residence of Mrs. John H. Cope, the president being in the chair. At a previous meeting the week before, the Association was organized and the following officers elected:
 Mrs. G. Frank Bamberg, president; Mrs. A. W. Knight, first vice president; Mrs. Jno. H. Cope, second vice president; Mrs. W. P. Jones, treasurer; Mrs. H. J. Brabham, Jr., recording secretary; Mrs. G. P. Harmon, corresponding secretary.
 This, the second meeting of the organization, was well attended, fourteen new members being enrolled, and much enthusiasm and interest was shown by those present.
 It was decided that there would be no initiation fee but dues of fifty cents per year for active members and \$1.00 for associate members, this amount to be paid in advance.
 The meetings will be held in the chapel of the Carlisle Fitting School on the fourth Thursday of each month at four o'clock.
 The town was divided into five wards, each ward having a delegation of women appointed by the president every month to inspect and report to the mayor anything unsanitary or not conducive to the good appearance of the town in said ward. A meeting of the officers was called to plan out work for the present month. The officers will meet this week when the committees for the various wards will be appointed.

PROHIBITION CAMPAIGN.

Distinguished Speakers Engaged to Deliver Addresses.
 Laurens, Oct. 7.—In view of the approaching election on the dispensary in this county the prohibition forces have planned a series of temperance rallies which will be held throughout the county this month. In addition to a number of local speakers, including Rev. W. E. Thayer, pastor of the First Baptist church, Hon. C. C. Featherstone, Rev. E. C. Watson, pastor of two of the large Baptist churches of the county, and the Rev. C. Lewis Fowler, pastor of the First Baptist church at Clinton, Dr. Geo. B. Cromer of Newberry and Dr. Chas. E. Burts, of Edgefield, have been invited to participate in the campaign. The election will be held on the 3rd of November, the same date of the general election. This will be the second effort to rid the county of dispensary, as it will be remembered that in January 1906, an election was held on the same proposition and anti-dispensary won by a small majority. However, the election was contested on certain alleged irregularities and after much litigation it was declared null and void. Consequently the shop has continued to do business, an exceedingly fine business too, considerably over \$100,000 a year.

DR. A. S. HYDRICK PARALYZED.

Highly Esteemed Orangeburg Physician Critically Ill.
 Orangeburg, Oct. 4.—Dr. Augustus S. Hydrick is lying critically ill at his home on East Russell street, in this city, having suffered a stroke of paralysis about 10:30 o'clock last night, while engaged in a game of chess with his son, Dr. D. J. Hydrick.
 There is no more beloved personage in Orangeburg than Dr. Hydrick, and the solicitude of the great number of callers at his residence attested the esteem in which he is held. The patient is receiving the attention of all the local physicians, and Dr. J. W. Babcock, of Columbia, will arrive here his afternoon for consultation.
 Dr. Hydrick's left side is affected. His condition all day has been practically the same. While great fears are entertained for his recovery, it is not impossible, and the entire community joins in the earnest hope that his life will be spared.
 Judge D. E. Hydrick, a brother, and other relatives have been summoned.

Dr. A. S. Hydrick Dead.

Orangeburg, Oct. 9.—Dr. A. S. Hydrick, loved and honored physician and leading citizen of this city, died this morning. He suffered a stroke of paralysis last Saturday night while playing a game of chess and never spoke after that. His funeral will take place Sunday morning from the Methodist church, and will be attended by the scholars of the graded school in a body and all the prominent organizations of the city.
 All of Orangeburg is grief-stricken. The city loses its most valuable citizen in the death of the great and good physician.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

State of South Carolina—County of Bamberg.
 Notice is hereby given that the General Election for Presidential and Vice-Presidential Electors and Representative in Congress will be held at the voting precincts fixed by law in the County of Bamberg, on Tuesday, November 3, 1908, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday, as prescribed by law.
 The qualifications for suffrages are as follows:
 Residence in State for two years, in the County, one year, in the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote, four months, and the payment six months before any election of any poll tax then due and payable. Provided, That ministers, in charge of an organized church and teachers of public schools shall be entitled to vote after six months' residence in the State, otherwise qualified.
 Registration.—Payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed and collectable during the previous year. The production of a certificate or receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.
 Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other Managers and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to the Chairman. The Managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.
 Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the City of Charleston, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p. m.
 The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy; and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint, from among the qualified voters, the Managers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.
 At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office, and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.
