### RIVER GIVES UP ITS DEAD.

#### Body of Young Man Drowned at Columbia Sunday Recovered.

Columbia, Aug. 30.—The body of O. T. Bryant, who was drowned yesterday, was found this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, about one mile down the Congaree. Mr. Bryant, who had been employed at the Olympia Mills, was a native of Davis, Clarendon county, and his brother, B. J. Bryant, came here this afternoon for the body. Mr. Bryant was out swimming Sunday with G. W. Parker, E. L. Warr, Willie Parker, Coke and Pierce Truett. The men were standing on a bank, which sloped downward. It is said that Bryant lost his head, and, although he could swim, in some manner went under. The body was found by men on a government dredge. The deceased was about 22 years of age.
