R. Trimmier, Spartanburg, registrar; Mrs. Mallie Perry, Lancaster, recorder of crosses; Mrs. Anna C. Ancrum, Camden, auditor.

Miss Mary Poppenheim, of Charleston, was nominated for president general of the general division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, in 1916. A resolution indorsing Miss Poppenheim was adopted with marked enthusiasm and a rising vote.
