UNITED STATES GEMS.

Total Value Mined Since 1880 Placed at \$8,159,971.

The total value of the precious stones-produced in the United States from 1880 to 1914 is placed by the geological survey at \$8,159,971. In recent years the mining of sapphire in Montana has developed into an industry of some importance and the production for 1913 has been estimated at \$238,635.
