**COTTON WEIGHERS' PAY RAISED.**

The county board met September 2nd, 1918, all the board being present. A petition was presented to raise the cotton weaver's pay from 5c to 10c per bale at Bamberg, which was favorably passed on.

Provided, 1st. That the said weaver shall furnish good and sufficient truckers to keep the cotton well out of the way and in the proper lines where neither farmer or merchant will have any trouble. If these duties are not complied with, please report to county commissioners at Bamberg.

A petition was also passed on to raise the cotton weaver's pay at Ehrhardt from 5 cents to 8 cents; these prices to take effect September 3rd, 1918. After passing on all claims the board adjourned.
