18,000 TURKS MADE PRISONERS.

British Deal Smashing Blow in Drive Through Palestine.

London, Sept. 22.—British troops in their drive north through Palestine already have counted 18,000 Turkish prisoners and have collected 120 guns, according to an official statement given out this evening by the British war office.

The text of the statement says: "By 9 o'clock on Saturday night our left wing, the infantry about Birafur had reached the line Beitdejan-Samaria-Birafur, shepherding the enemy on the west of the Jerusalem-Nabulus road into the arms of our cavalry, operating southward from Jenin and Beisan.
 "Other enemy columns vainly attempted to escape into the Jordan valley in the direction of Jiar-Ed-Dameer, which is still held by us. These columns suffered severely from our aircraft which constantly harassed them with bombs and machine gun fire from low altitudes.
