RESOLUTIONS

Passed by the Bamberg Baptist Sunday School, April 6, 1919.

When Sister Susie Counts departed this life a few weeks ago, there was ended one of the most useful lives Bamberg has ever known. Sister Counts became a Christian in girlhood. She was a woman of rare culture, charming personality, pleasing manners, spiritual attainments and an unselfish disposition. Her thought was largely of others, and many bless her name for the deeds of kindness bestowed by her loving hands. Her strength was continuously taxed during the last years of her life with the constant care of an invalid son; yet

faithfully and uncomplainingly did she minister to him till he passed away a few weeks before she did. Sister Counts went to Baltimore for an operation last summer. This failed, however, to bring permanent relief, and she gradually gave way till the end came. She was cheerful and courageous to the end. The devotion of the members of the family was beautiful to see, as they watched by her side and ministered to her needs day and night till the last.

Mrs. Counts was in her sixty-third year. She was the daughter of Dr. Alex. and Mrs. Addie Hayes Johnson. She was married to Thos. J. Counts on Feb. 13, 1879, by Rev. Jas. Buist. From this union were born one son, Curry, who preceded his mother to the grave only a few weeks, and one daughter, Pearl, who is the only surviving member of the immediate family. Her husband died some years ago. Mrs. Counts is also survived by one brother, R. R. Johnson, of Bamberg, and four sisters, Mrs. A. S. Easterling, Mrs. W. E. Spann, Mrs. H. F. Spahn, and Miss Roberta Johnson, all of Bamberg.

In the death of Sister Counts the Bamberg Baptist church has sustained a great loss. She had taught the infant class in the Sunday school for about 30 years. She was active in the Missionary society, having served as president. At one time she was organist for the church.

Since God in his providence has taken her from our midst the Bamberg Baptist church and Sunday school wish to give an expression of appreciation in the following resolutions:

1. That in the death of Sister Counts our church has lost a useful member, our Sunday school a devoted teacher, and the community a kind friend.
 2. That we bow submissively to the will of Him who doeth all things well.
 3. That our deepest sympathy is hereby expressed to the family.
 4. That we heartily commend the steps taken by the Woman's Missionary Society to establish a memorial to Sister Counts in the Hall of Fame of the Home Mission Board's church building fund.
 5. That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the daughter and that they be published in the Baptist Courier and the town papers.
