
DR. WATSON PLEADS FOR MORE SPIRITUALITY.


A Memphis lawyer entered his condemned client's cell: "Well," he said, "good news at last."

Organs of Spartanburg Man in Wrong Place.

Spartanburg, May 28.—With his heart on right side, his liver on his left side, and various other internal organs situated in positions of the anatomy just opposite to those ordinarily accepted as the proper locations for such organs, a prominent person of Spartanburg county is causing local physicians and surgeons much thought. The discovery that this person possesses an anatomy seldom encountered by men of the medical world was made this week when he visited the office of a Spartanburg physician for the purpose of undergoing examination. The person had experienced much pain in his side and fearing he was about to be stricken with appendicitis he visited the physician's office.
