### Ganges in Flood inundates Indian Villages

Cawnpore, India, Nov. 8.—The great rise of the Ganges river, which has broken all records of the past 30 years, has led to the flooding of vast districts on the Unao side. Many villages on both sides of the railway line to Unao are under water, and hundreds of hamlets have been washed away.

The floods are on the decline now, but the rains continue intermittently, making the lot of those rendered homeless still harder. People whose houses have been washed away have taken shelter in neighboring villages, and some have been accommodated in railway cars. Virtually all the villages situated along the banks of the Ramganga river have been inundated. Houses and cattle have been washed away, and standing crops ruined.

In some places the rise of the river was so sudden that people who were in the fields tending their cattle or crops were cut off. Many were compelled to take refuge in trees until the floods subsided. Others were rescued by relief parties. Planks were tied together and let down from railway bridges on the Ramganga, enabling a number of people struggling in the water to be hoisted to safety.

The railway line between Kathgarh and Got has been washed out for about seven hundred feet, and cannot be repaired for some time. The railway connection with Delhi also has been cut. The Lucknow road is still impassable in many places, and no communication is possible with outlying villages.

Large supplies of food, sent by the citizens of Cawnpore, have helped to relieve the distress.

### Wood For Boxes

It is calculated that about 15 per cent of all the lumber produced in the United States is consumed in the manufacture of wooden boxes. This is an item of large enough volume to make it quite a problem as to the sources from which box lumber shall be obtained in these days of decreasing lumber production.

A few years ago when wood was much cheaper than now, basswood, poplar and cotton wood were very commonly used for boxes. In later years there has been much use of the gum trees in box making. Now the cabinet workers and furniture makers are beginning to complain that red gum is too good a wood to be used in boxes. The tendency is for the box manufacturers to be driven to lower grades of lumber. Notwithstanding the introduction of various substitutes for wooden boxes and packages, the demand for them keeps up and no suitable substitutes are in sight for many purposes. Florida alone requires about 15,000,000 boxes for the annual stock of the citrus fruits and California requires about the same number for the same purpose.

More than two-thirds of the low grade product of the North Carolina pine region is ordinarily used for box purposes. Nearly 50 per cent of loblolly or North Carolina pine goes into boxes; 35 per cent of shortleaf pine in the same territory; about 8 per cent of longleaf pine and a smaller percentage of the other softwoods in that region. Most of the other pine box lumber used in the East comes from the second growth pine of white and other species in New England territory.

### Women Athletes of France Sign Peace Compact

Paris, Nov. 8.—Peace has been officially signed between the two warring feminine federations of athletic women of France. A temporary truce was declared last July in order to hold at Pershing Stadium the first feminine Olympic games on record in which the United States team carried off second honors.

Gaston Vidal, Under Secretary of State for Physical Culture and Sports acted as peacemaker. Both federations elected officers to represent them in the Union of French Sporting and Athletic Federations, and henceforth they will be known as the Feminine Federation of France.

The new Federation comprises 144 feminine clubs and athletic organizations throughout France with a membership of nearly fifteen thousand young women and girls.

### Moscow Covering up Scars of Rebel Bullets

Moscow, Nov. 8.—Putty and cement by the ton are being used in Moscow in an effort on the part of the government to blot out traces of the revolution of 1917.

There is scarcely a house in the Soviet capital which was not bullet marked, more or less, in the fighting, and some of the larger buildings were peppered with lead and steel from rifles, machine guns and shrapnel. Within the last few weeks hundreds of workmen have been engaged in the task of filling the bullet holes with cement and putty, and in many instances the walls have been painted, thus wiping out the visible scars of the days of terror which swept the Bolsheviks into power.

### Humane Association Has More Than 500 Chapters

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Since the first meeting of the American Humane association in Cleveland, October 9, 1922, the organization has grown until there are more than 50 active anti-cruelty societies in the United States, according to a report issued here by officials of the organization.

"At the time this association was organized child protection work was yet in its infancy and the movement in behalf of the protection of animals had only recently started," the report stated.

"The interval from the beginning until now has been occupied by intense activities and development on the part of the humane movement. It is easy now to gauge the practical advancement of the humane cause."

"From the very point our work has grown until there are more than 500 active anti-cruelty societies in the United States. The annual income of our societies has increased to over a million dollars. There is an army of paid employees and voluntary agents. Many of our societies own buildings, the aggregate value of which runs into millions of dollars. Endowments amount to over four million dollars."

### Aggressive warfare has been carried on to protect the rights of children and to give them ample opportunity to be fitted for the battle of life. The interest in animal protection also has vastly increased.

Lay Cornerstone Nebraska's New \$5,000,000 Capital, November 11th

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—Armistice Day observances in Nebraska this year will be centered in the impressive ceremonies at the site of the new five million dollar Nebraska statehouse, which will be dedicated in cornerstone laying ceremonies to the memory of Nebraska's sons who made the supreme sacrifice in the world war.

The details of the exercises will be in charge of the leading military and civic organizations of the state which has arranged the opening of the ceremonies with the most resplendent parade ever witnessed on Lincoln's streets. Among prominent persons who are on the program for addresses are National Commander Alvin Owsley of the American Legion; Texas; General John J. Pershing, Nebraska; and Governor S. E. McKelvie of Nebraska, all of whom will take an active part in laying the

### Government Forces Down Power Rates

Osaka, Nov. 8.—Charges for electric power, extensively used by the factories of Japan, gradually are returning to the pre-war rates under pressure from the government, which has power to regulate rates and also because of the decline in the price of coal, the amalgamation of various electric companies and the alteration from steam to water power for producing current. In Osaka, the chief industrial city, the rate for lighting has been reduced from 62 sen to 53 sen, and that for power from 8.5 sen to 7 sen.

Since 1887, when electric enterprises were started in Japan, more than 800 companies with a capital of more than a billion yen have been organized.

Bessemer steel beams in connection with cast-iron columns to form a complete frame in building construction were first used in Chicago in 1883.
