Death of Mrs.

Nyra Garner Nelson

Our church and entire community was saddened on the 2nd day of November, 1922, by the death of Mrs. Nyra Garner Nelson at Davenport, Iowa. She had been ill for some time but none of us dreamed that the end was so near. The news of her going came with such a shock that it cast a gloom over the entire city.

She was the daughter and only child of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Garner of this place. Her marriage to Mr. W. R. Nelson, of Culpeper, Va., was one of the brilliant and beautiful social events of the summer of 1921. She and her husband had been living in Davenport, Iowa, since their marriage and were taking special courses of study to further prepare them for the noble calling to which both had dedicated their lives.

She was educated at Clifford Seminary and Coker college, having graduated from the latter in 1918. While attending college she was not only brilliant in her studies, but was one of the most popular students with both the faculty and student body. As one of her teachers said: "She was one of most loved and honored students the college ever had." She specialized in both vocal and instrumental music. After leaving Coker she took further studies at Brookfield, Conn., and in New York under Prof. Herbert Wilbur Green.

She was converted in early life and dedicated her splendid talents to her Lord. She was one of the sweetest and most accomplished singers I have ever heard. For some time she sang in the choir of the Citadel Square Baptist church and afterwards was soloist and choir leader of the King Street Baptist church. At both places her work was of the highest order. The impress of her beautiful Christian character and splendid service is indelibly stamped upon, not only the churches in which she worked, but upon the lives of all she came in contact with everywhere.

The funeral services were conducted at the King St. Baptist church Sunday afternoon November 5th, 1922, by her pastor, Rev. J. G. Graham, and Dr. C. C. Coleman of the Citadel Square church. The quartet of the Citadel Square Baptist church rendered several beautiful and favorite selections. The tremendous crowd present showed how wide was her circle of friends. The body was carried from the church and laid to rest in the beautiful Magnolia cemetery beneath a huge bank of flowers to await the glorious resurrection morn.

She is survived by her husband, father, mother and infant son, Edward Warren Nelson. Our deepest sympathy goes out to these dear ones in a real way, for we, too, feel the great loss.—Baptist Courier.
