Cotton Saw Gins.

THE subscriber informs his friends and the public in general, that he still continues the above business of making and repairing Cotton Saw Gins. His price is reduced, for two reasons; first the low price of cotton; and secondly, because he is in debt, which he hopes to discharge by extending the sale of his Gins even at reduced prices. All being in debt was occasioned by his undertaking a manufactory, during the time of the embargo and late war; and also, his having been absent from his business nearly six months in the United States service, in the years 1814 and 15, during which time his manufactory and the business of his shop were suspended, just when they began to be of some avail. On his return home, after peace was made, his manufactory, of course, was abandoned, and all the machinery belonging to it rendered useless.

In 1819, he took his son and son-in-law into partnership—they have worked with him ever since the spring of 1815. The best of gins will be made by Wm. McCright, Son & McCright, and delivered at their shop in this place, at 50 cents per saw. Their shop at Cheraw will also be continued, and Gins delivered there at the same price. He deems it unnecessary to add any thing respecting the quality of their Gins, as they have been long and extensively tried and well approved.
