RICHLAND SCHOOL.

It is designed to obviate many of the defects in our common schools, as learning, and to combine, as far as practicable, all the improvements of the age on the important subject of Education. An Elementary Department, comprising Reading, Spelling, Writing, Geography, Arithmetic, and English Grammar. As a thorough knowledge of these branches is indispensable in laying the foundation of a good Education, every student, in the early course of his study will be required to be master of them.

A Classical Department, embracing the Latin and Greek, French, Spanish, and Italian languages. The Latin and Greek, will be taught thoroughly and grammatically. A Scientific Department, comprising the higher branches of Mathematics, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Topography, Mensuring heights and distances, Surveying, Navigation, Civil Engineering, Natural Philosophy, Natural History, and the application of Mathematics to Architecture, and to the principles of Mechanics.

A Commercial Department, embracing Book keeping by single and double entry, the forms of commercial instruments, with all that relates to the details of commercial transactions, the history and objects of commerce, its influence on society and civil liberty, and its connection with Political Economy and International Law; the Constitution of the United States, with the best illustration of its principles, furnished by contemporary exposition, and legislative and judicial decisions.

An Agricultural Department, in which will be taught Chemistry, Mineralogy, Geology, Zoology and Botany, so far as these sciences are of importance in a practical application to the purposes of Agriculture. The character of different soils, with the best method of improving them, and their adaptation to different productions; the raising of stock for labor or food, with the crosses and vegetable for their use; the implements of husbandry for saving and facilitating labor, with all that relates to practical farming. A well cultivated farm will be attached to the institution for the purposes of experiment and practical illustration.

A Department of Military Science and Physical Education, embracing the principles and practice of the Military Science, Gymnastics, and all that relates to health and Physical Education. All the students of suitable age will be formed into a Military Corps for stated drill and discipline.—This is designed to add one profitable variety to the department of Exercise and Physical Education, while it imparts practical knowledge in a science intimately connected with the duty of every American citizen. A regular and systematic course of exercise will be practised by every student, in which due regard will be had to his former habits, particular constitution, and the wishes or directions of his parents.

Those students who are designed for College, will be prepared to enter any of the classes. Those who wish to complete their education at this institution, will receive a course of instruction truly liberal, and adapted to their intended pursuits in life. They may pursue the full course, embraced in all the Departments, or such parts of it only as are applicable to the designs of their education. Apparat, for the illustration, and practical application of the mathematical and physical sciences, will be procured, as the circumstances of the school require.

The students will be divided into sections of ten, and the whole number limited to one hundred. A teacher will be assigned to each section, and with his section, will occupy a separate building constructed for their study and dormitory. He will associate with them, both in their studies and amusements, and will at all times have a supervision over every part of their conduct.

The government will be parental, kind and liberal, but firm; and addressed to the good and honorable feelings of the students, who will in all cases, be heard with the teachers in the style and manner of a well regulated family. Their lodging will be in single beds, and on mattresses, and the whole system of regimen such, as will be most conducive to their health and comfort.

The most perfect regularity in their studies, exercises and amusements, and the constant employment of time to some useful and practical purpose, will be required and enforced, by which early habits of attention, industry, and perseverance, will be formed, and will impart to after life their tone and influence. To cultivate, and establish such habits, the teachers will direct unremitting efforts.

The morals of the youth will be guarded by their removal from temptation to vice, and by the parental government, constantly exercised over them. Their health will be preserved by the salubrity of the situation, by the utmost cleanliness in their rooms and persons, and especially by that whole some physical discipline in gymnastic and military exercise, which will cultivate a manly deportment, give strength and energy to the constitution, and restore the scholar to his studies with renewed vigor and vigor.

The following Regiments and Corps will go to the review and exercise at the times and places specified below, viz:

The 10th, Col. Hunt's Regiment, the 17th, Col. Cogdell's, Yeoman's artillery and Cavalry, near Charleston, on Wednesday, the 4th March next.

The 10th, Col. Walter's Regiment, at Fairport on Saturday, the 7th March.

The 12th, Col. Rice's Regiment, at Walterborough, on Tuesday the 10th.

The 12th, Col. Jacob's Regiment, at Coatesville on Friday the 13th.

The 3rd, Col. Jesse Rice's Regiment, at Beaufort bridge, Tuesday the 17th.

The 11th, Col. Cooper's, at Ashley's on Thursday the 19th.

The 16th, Col. Arthur's, at Williamston on Saturday the 21st.

Maj. Coughlin's Squadron of Cavalry at Jones bridge, Monday the 23d.

The 14th, Col. Leake's Regiment, at Snell's, on Wednesday the 26th March.
