

# Allen Yellow-Jackets Clash With Benedict Tigers In Annual "Battle" Saturday

The Allen University Yellowjackets and Benedict College Tigers did their primping behind closed gates this week, as they worked down toward their annual "battle" here Saturday afternoon on Antisdel Field.

Game time is set for 2 P. M. and supporters from over the state, not to mention the city, are expected to pour through the gate in almost unending stream.

This year's tilt will mean more than any previous game now that both are members of the SIAC. The record shows that each team is even in games since 1924. Benedict's team is composed mostly of freshmen, while the Yellowjackets have more experience. In two 1948 starts Allen has played 500 ball. They defeated Morris Brown 6-0 and lost to Tennessee 27-2. Benedict has no wins in two starts, having lost to Florida 20-6 and a close one to Lane 15-14.

## Appeal Issued For Morris College

GREENVILLE, S. C.—An appeal by trustees, moderators and members of Baptist churches, and to friends of Negro education, was made in behalf of the current campaign to subscribe \$80,000 for the improvement of Morris College at Sumter by the Reverend E. W. D. Stewart, Drive Director, on Monday.

Rev. Stewart called attention to the fact that the trustees and interested members of the church had selected and voted several days ago to raise this amount in order that the college might be brightened and restored to state accreditation. The first report is to be made on Thanksgiving Day at Morris College and is to be \$20,000.

The mid-winter session is to report another \$20,000 and the final \$10,000 is to be on hand at the close of the current school year.

The plan for the campaign proceeds, Rev. Stewart said, is that full time churches report \$100 each, those holding two services a month, \$50 each and those with one monthly service, \$25.
