**NACGN Not To Disband, Says Mrs. Staupers, Its Head**

NEW YORK —(ANP)—The National Association of Colored Graduates Nurses is not planning to dissolve. Mrs. Mabel K. Staupers, national president, declared emphatically this week. Appearing as guest on a local radio program last Saturday evening, Mrs. Staupers revealed plans for increased rather than lessened NACGN activity during the next two years at least.

"Reports that the 41-year-old organization, which represents Negro nurses nationally, expected to close up shop by the end of the year are absolutely false," said Mrs. Staupers. She ascribed the circulation of these reports to misunderstanding of the new working relationship between the NACGN and the American Nurses' association which was ratified at the recent NACGN convention in Louisville, Ky.

"The invitation extended by the ANA," explained Mrs. Staupers, "was for greater participation by NACGN and fuller integration of Negro nurses into ANA's program. In accepting this invitation, NACGN agreed that ANA could absorb some of our organization's functions.

**Teacher Weds Noted Specialist**

BORDENTOWN, N. J. —(ANP)—Mrs. Teresa Staats, widely known art instructor of this city surprised her many friends last week with the announcement of her marriage to Dr. George W. Prince, prominent Chicago pediatrician here on Wednesday, Aug. 31.

**Mrs. Pittman Gets First Deputy Spot With Episcopalians**

OMAHA, (A. N. P.) — Mrs. Elizabeth Davis Pittman, active Episcopal laywoman in the Diocese of Nebraska, has been elected to attend the General Convention of Episcopalians to be held in San Francisco, Calif., from Sept. 26 through Oct. 7. The last triennial general convention held in 1946 at Philadelphia marked the first time in the entire history of the Episcopal church that a woman had ever been seated in the House of Deputies, which is the law making body of the Episcopal church and is composed of laymen. At the 1949 convention, three women will be seated in the legislative body, and Mrs. Pittman is the first Negro woman to be so honored in the many centuries of the existence of the Episcopal church.

"She is a practicing member of the Omaha bar. Admitted last year, Mrs. Pittman has formed a partnership with her father, Atty. Charles F. Davis.

Be sure to watch your manners at home, in the street, in the office, the church, restaurants and certainly on or in all public conveyances.

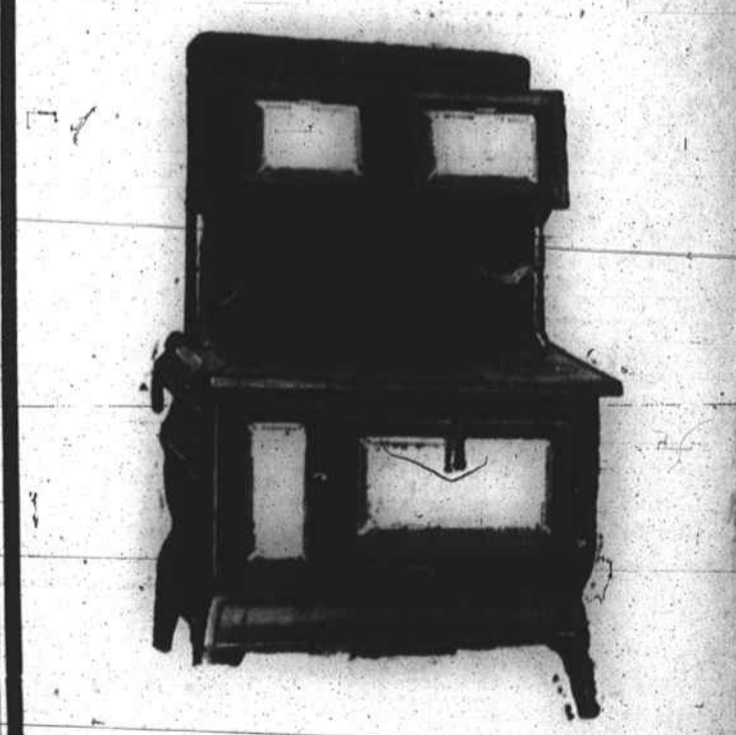
Know your telephone manners. Never stay on the telephone too long. Think of others who might want to use it. And use that soft voice when talking over the telephone.

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
