The first weekly Negro magazine in the country, JET went on sale (15 cents per copy) throughout the country Friday.

JET will contain up-to-date minute digests of the most important Negro news in the country and abroad, features on important Negro personalities and outstanding photographs which have become a well-established part of the Johnson publications.

JET is the fourth member of the nine-year-old Johnson Publishing Company. The other publications are EBONY, the picture monthly which today, with a circulation of nearly 500,000, is the leading Negro publication in the world; TAN CONFESSIONS, a romantic type publication with a circulation of 300,000, and NEGRO DIGEST, circulation 100,000, which, effective immediately, will be changed from a monthly to a quarterly.

Through the years, radio has enjoyed a phenomenal growth. From its birth the broadcasting industry has turned its facilities more and more towards on-the-spot reporting until today—12 years after the first WIS broadcast—many hours are spent each day by the WIS News and Special Events Department to gather, edit, and air the headline happenings.

The general public today is infinitely more news-conscious than 20 years ago, and radio is largely responsible. The fact is undoubtedly traceable to the events immediately prior to World War II when the tremendous radio coverage from European and Pacific vantage points brought news—as it has loped—into every American living room.

Hooper ratings, Pulse reports, and Nielsen indexes indicate an ever-growing audience for news and special events features. Radio has never sought to compete with the newspaper; radio does seek to "get there first", and to stimulate a desire for more information. The implication is an obvious one: "for further details, consult your local newspaper."

Radio news is, perforce, front-page news in capsule form. Radio commentators, ever alert to their responsibilities, make effort to state only the facts, and to allow the general public to draw the conclusions. Special features, frequently originating from many thousands of miles distant, keep the listener posted on far-away events with an heretofore impossible speed.

At WIS, in addition to two wire services—a radio wire and a press wire—the News and Special Events Department employs a Washington correspondent whose job it is to secure news of special interest to the people of South Carolina. Too, news sources of state and local importance are jealously coveted.
