Celebrate that great day for the Irish by having some friends in for tea and serving them Irish Soda Bread. There couldn't be a more perfect bread to serve on St. Patrick's Day. What makes it so Irish are the caraway seeds. The Irish are noted for scattering these tasty little seeds into many of the dishes they make.

IRISH SODA BREAD

2 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup sweet milk

Light oven and set at 375°F. Sift some flour onto a piece of waxed paper. Measure 2 cups and sift with flour, soda, salt and sugar into large mixing bowl. Cut in shortening with two knives or pastry blender. Stir in raisins and caraway seeds. Mix together vinegar and milk. Add to flour mixture and blend with a fork. Turn into greased 9" pie plate, spread or pat smooth. Bake at 375°F. (moderate oven) 30 minutes or until done. Serve hot in wedges with lots of butter.

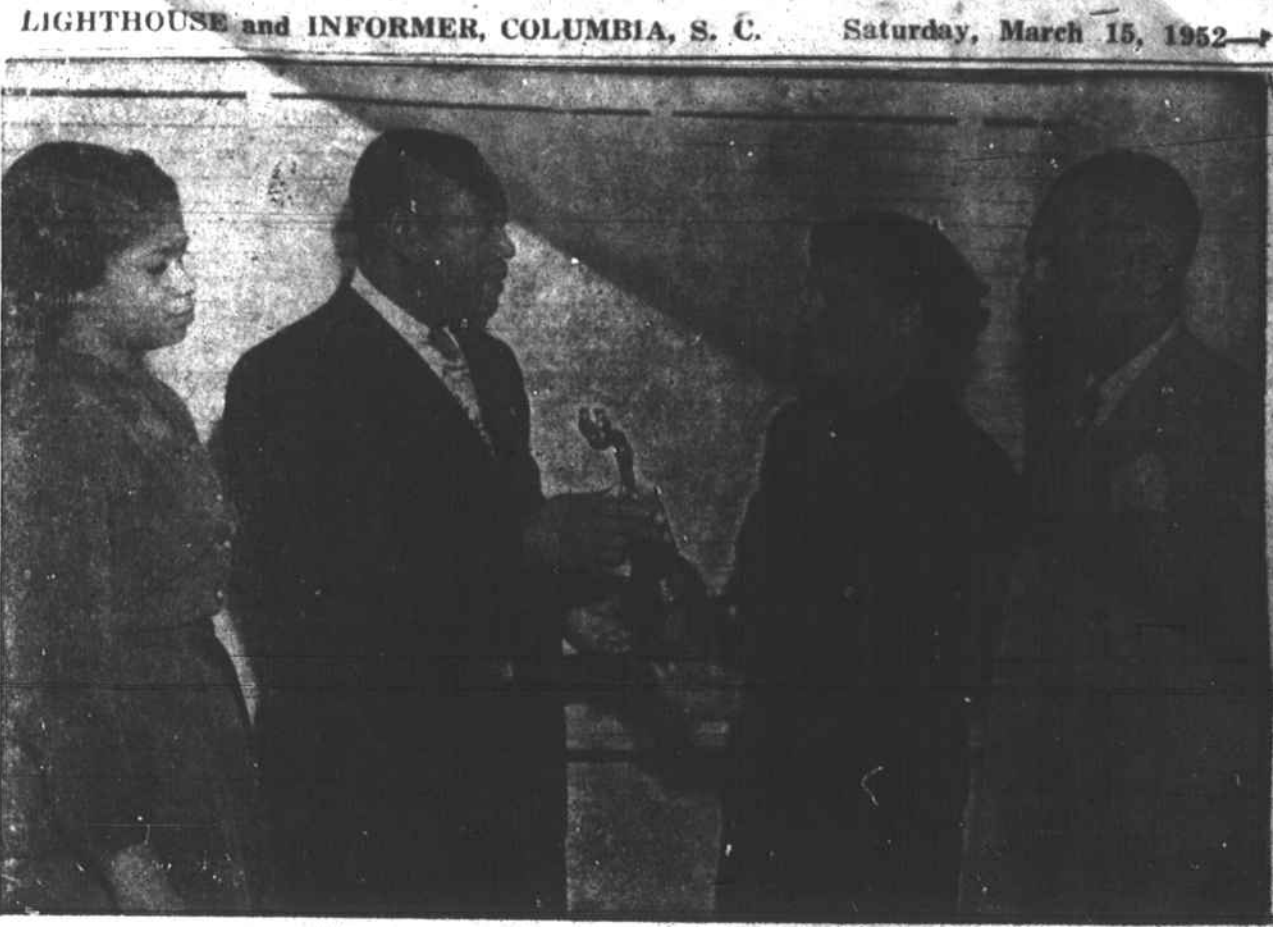
