**COVER PICTURE**

The Southern Telephone News cover picture this month is entitled "A Veteran's Tribute" which it explained as follows:

"The cover design this month is one of many similar scenes enacted during the past year. A Confederate veteran is giving to Maj. Todd; U. S. A. a Chicago man and the son of a Union veteran a bouquet of flowers and the privileges of the city of Lexington S. C.

"The sons of the South are fighting side by side with those of the North; east and West. Whatever imaginary lines might previously have existed are now entirely obliterated.

"Men from every part of the nation have been trained in the big camps at Columbia; Charlotte; Greenville; Spartanburg; Atlanta; Macon; Jacksonville; Anniston; Hattiesburg; Alexandria and Louisville. The homes in each community have been open to them and the civil population has vied with the soldiers in patriotism and in unselfish service to win the war." Columbia Record.

NOTE—The Confederate veteran referred to above is our fellowtownsman Col. M. D. Harman and the picture shows him handing Maj. Todd a bouquet of beautiful roses at the front gate of his home on Main St. The incident occurred during the encampment of the Field Signal Battalion in Lexington and the business manager of the Dispatch-News is proud to say that he had the pleasure of introducing Col. Harman and Maj. Todd.
