

DON'T FORGET FAIR EXHIBITS.

While threshing your grain you should remember and look carefully for good bundles and save them for the exhibit you are planning for your county fair. Don't neglect this as a fair is just as necessary now as ever and it is up to you to see that your county makes a candidate exhibit. Too many farmers depend upon the other fellow to get up exhibits and when the time for fair arrives there may be a dearth of material to show. You know how often you have visited other fairs and have remarked that you had better stuff on your place than was shown. Home is not the place to keep good farm products during the fair. Show the people what good stuff you can raise and this may stimulate some to try and do likewise. If you don't send in an exhibit yourself don't criticize the other fellow, for he has done his best and you have laid down on the job. Visitors to your county fair judge your county by what they see and it is up to you to help make your county make as good an agricultural show as possible.

Get those good hogs and cattle in condition and send them up too. If you are trying to raise breeding stock and don't exhibit you very probably won't make a great success because farmers like hogs that look good. The county fair is one of the best places to advertise your stock so get up and get up an exhibit for this year—Carolina Farmer and Stockman.

STOP THE RED SPIDER.

Find that the red spider is, and has been doing considerable damage in Lexington county, much more than I have seen in any previous year. The extremely dry weather has been very favorable for the spread of the spider. In nearly every instance where I have answered calls to infested farms, I have been able to trail the spider from polk stalks or violet beds. I want to advise all farmers to keep polk stalks cut off hedges and terrace banks or any other places that they are growing on the farm. Where cotton is planted near the yard, keep violets out of the yard. There are other plants on which the spider feeds, but polk stalks and violets are the best breeding places.

How to Handle the Spider.

The red spider is a quite small insect that fastens itself on the under side of cotton leaves, and causes them to turn red on top side. After being infested for a few weeks, leaves drop off and the plant loses young fruit. When this spider makes its appearance on the cotton, cut down, clean up and burn the breeding places. Then pull all badly infested stalks of cotton and burn them. Spray around infested spots with the following solution:

1 lb. arsenate of lead.
2 lbs. slacked lime.
2 gallons of water.
Spray on under side of leaves. Keep watch on the above pest and put him under control as soon as he makes his appearance.

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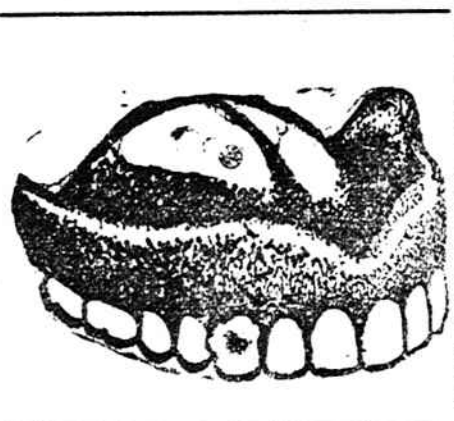
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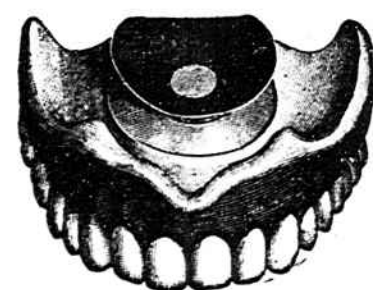
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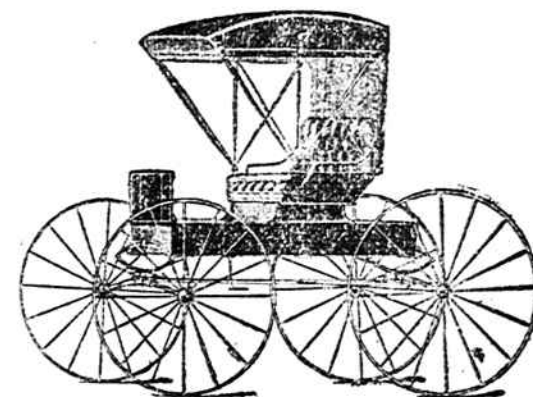
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
