The late Carlton W. Sawyer had a most successful administration, regarded so by all factions. At his death Governor Manning appointed Mr. Sawyer's Chief Clerk Rut L. Osborne as Comptroller to fill the unexpired term.

Mr. Osborne is well known by many Lexington County men. He was endorsed to the Governor by the people of his home County without reserve. Since his appointment he has been urged to make the race for the long term by County Officials from all over the State. These County Officials work in concord with the Comptroller General's office and their endorsement should have great weight. They know the man.

Comptroller Osborne is a young man full of energy and ambition. He has been refused enlistment in the U. S. A. and Navy seven times. His first official act was to reduce the State levy from 9 1-2 to 8 1-4 mills.
