Our birds have been aptly called our "Policemen of the air." They destroy a prodigious number of harmful insects and noxious weed seeds, and protect our health as well as our crops. Without them our problems of health and protection would be greatly complicated.

The game birds and animals of the State are the property of all the people. The few who hunt and kill them lawfully are willing to pay the small license the law requires; those who hunt them illegally will be prosecuted and fined.

The Game Department of the State under its present management has been entirely self supporting and has paid all expenses from fines and licenses, and returned over \$13,000.00 in cash for the last fiscal year to the license countries.

We should have a State wide license law so as to be able to protect our birds, fish and game all over South Carolina.

We urge our representatives and citizens to co-operate for the passage of such a law so as to keep our State from becoming birdless, gameless and fishless.
