Tax Returns.

Office of County Auditor
Kershaw county,
Camden, S. C., Dec. 6, 1938.

Notice is hereby given that the Auditor's office for receiving State and County tax returns will be open from January 1st, 1939, to February 23rd, 1939.

The dates of the appointments at which the Auditor or his deputy will visit the usual places in the County for receiving returns are given below:

Bethune, January 11.
Raley's Mill, January 12.
Bowers' School House, January 13.
Kirkley's Store, January 11.
Kershaw, January 15 and 16.
Westville, January 18.
Russell Place, January 19.
Liberty Hill, January 23.
Liberty, January 21.

The law requires that all persons owning property or in anywise having charge of such property either as agent, husband, guardian, trustee, executor, administrator, &c., return the same under oath to the Auditor, who requests all persons to be prompt in making their returns and save the 50 per cent penalty which will be added to the property valuation of all persons who fail to make returns within the time prescribed by law.

INCOME TAX.

Under an Act of the Legislature all persons having a gross income of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars or more are required to make a return of the same to the Auditor at the same time of making their other returns.

All returns sent by mail must be made out on proper blanks and sworn to before some officer qualified to administer and oath, otherwise they will not be received at this office as returns.

The County Board of Equalization will meet at the office of the County Auditor on the 4th Tuesday of March, 1939, for the purpose of equalizing property, hearing complaints and protests.

Whitewash.
We publish again at the request of many subscribers the following recipe for whitewash, which has been tested and found good:
Suck one-half bushel of unshelled lime with boiling water, keeping it covered during the process. Strain it and add a

peck of salt dissolved in warm water. Add also three pounds of ground rice put in boiling water and boiled to a thin paste; one half pound of powdered Spanish whitening, and a pound of clear glue dissolved in warm water. Mix all these well together, and let the mixture stand for several days. Keep the wash thus prepared in a kettle or portable furnace, and, when used, put it on as hot as possible, with painter's or white-wash brushes. This whitewash has been found by experience to answer on wood, brick and stone nearly as well as oil paint, and it is much cheaper.

Our Seed and Planting Schedule
Grand after November 25th.
Passenger Train No. 81 of the Seaboard, which has stops at all stations between Hamlet and Columbia, will make business trips between these points, viz: Cheraw, Milledgeville and Camden, and will leave Camden station a few minutes earlier than as now at 7:17 a. m. north bound, and 7:19 p. m. north bound.

A local passenger service will be established with Train No. 67 which will make stop at all stations between Hamlet and Columbia. This train will leave Hamlet at 7:35 a. m. and pass Camden at about 9:50 a. m. It will leave Columbia at 4:50 p. m. arriving at Camden about 5:09 p. m.

There will be no change in the schedules of trains 66 and 48 which may pass Camden station at 6:30 a. m. and 10:10 p. m.

When the Limited is put on, which will be on or about Jan. 1st, we will be in the enjoyment of the services of eight passenger trains daily, instead of four as now.

This speaks well for the enterprise of the S. A. L., and the projected change of schedule will be of great convenience to not only the traveling public, but to our people as well. Under this schedule, all those having business at Columbia or intermediate points, or at points north, are afforded ample time to transit and return to their homes that evening.
