South Carolina is to have her first woman lawyer in the person of Miss Mary Yeargin, who has gone to Cornell University to study law.

A review of the Democratic victory in Georgia discloses the fact that the Alliance lacked a good deal of being "left out in the cold." Among the new State officers Gov. Northen, Treasurer Hardeman, Secretary of State Cook, and Agricultural Commissioner Nesbit are all active members of the Farmers' Alliance. In the list of Democratic Congressional nominees we find Alliancemen Livingston, Moses and Lawson General John B. Gordon, United States Senator, is also a full-fledged member of the order. So it is seen that the Third Party in Georgia does not constitute the Alliance. Hon. J. M. Smith, one of the ablest campaign orators in that State, is also an Allianceman. The members of that organization were divided in their political views.

Atlantic Coast Line.

By the completion of the "Short Cut" from Wilson, N. C., to Florence, S. C., via Fayetteville, the distance between eastern cities and Columbia, Charleston, Savannah and Florida points has been reduced 61 miles. This, together with an increased rate of speed, agreed upon for this service, will cause material reduction of time between all points east and south, via this popular line.

Arrangements have been made for the most complete Pullman Sleeping Car service ever attempted, consisting of through sleepers from Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Richmond and to Charleston, Savannah, Thomasville, Jacksonville, St. Augustine, Rockledge, Palatka, Sanford, Winter Park, Kissimmee, Tampa and Port Tampa.

Three fast express trains will be run daily, each way, during the season. In addition the elaborately equipped "Florida special," a vestibule train with Dining Car, Library and Observation Car, lighted throughout with electric lights and heated by the most approved method of steam heating, will run as heretofore tri-weekly.

The time will be reduced: From New York to Charleston to about 22 hours. New York to Savannah to about 25 hours. New York to St. Augustine to about 30 hours. Washington to Charleston to about 15 hours. Washington to Savannah to about 18 hours. Washington to Jacksonville to about 23 hours.

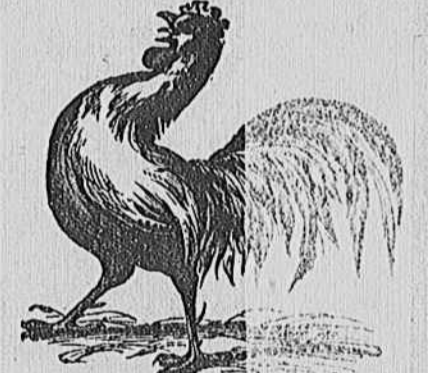
