COURT SALE.

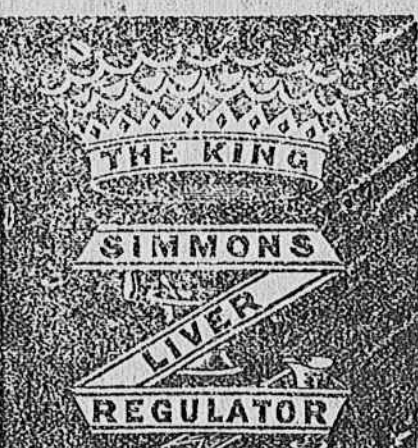
