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A Corruption Fund. Stands By His Guns. The Republican machine in Indiana is making desperate efforts to embarrass the colored man who is running for Co. reg. in the Indianapolis district as an independent Republican, but the colored man stands by his guns and declares he will not be bulldozed. There are some five thousand colored voters in the district, but the Republican machine has never permitted them to get within smelling distance of the "doughdish" at the polls. It has always claimed their votes as Divine right. It is the same way in Massachusetts, where an intelligent colored man, who had served in his party well, dared aspire to congressional honor. He was one of three candidates at the Republican primaries, but was beaten out of sight.

Lost in Terrific Gale. A dispatch from Chatham, Mass., says a small part of the forward section of the hull and a slanting foremast stood as mute reminders of the tragedy enacted there Friday night when the three-masted schooner Wentworth of Moncton, N. B., struck on Chatham bar during a raging nor'easter gale and all on board perished in the terrific seas. With the exception of the loss of the steamer Portland in November, 1898, the wreck of the Wentworth is the worst disaster that has occurred on the Cape Cod coast during the last decade. Of the 12 persons who were on board the stranded vessel, not one reached the shore alive, although two bodies were rescued from the surf Friday morning. One of them that of a woman, believed to be the wife of the captain. With her three children she was accompanying her husband on a trip from Hillsboro, N. B., to Newark, N. J.

A Blind Murderer. A triple tragedy occurred about three and a half miles east of Plano, Texas, Thursday afternoon when Will Cochran, a blind man who has been separated from his wife for about six weeks, led by his nephew, fifteen years old, called at his mother-in-law's house, entered the front door, called for his wife. When she sat down by him he grabbed her, stabbing her to death with a dirk and then killed his mother-in-law, Mrs. James Skelton, seventy-three years old. He then walked around the house about twenty-five yards, stuck his dirk in the ground, and pulling out a pistol, shot his brains out and died instantly.

In Each Others Arms. A suicide has resulted in the death of Miss Minnie Hland, 20 years old, and Lulu Cook, 14 years old, daughters of farmers, 20 miles south of Kankakee, Ill. Clashed in each others arms, the two, drank the contents of an ounce bottle of strychnine. Death came before medical aid could be summoned. The reading of obituary notices is said to have led to the suicides.

Must Toe the Mark. Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, said Thursday that he had sent notices to the 50 or more candidates on the county Democratic ticket requesting them to decline endorsement by any party other than their own. "Democrats must be Democrats and nothing else," said Mr. Murphy. The Populists have endorsed a number of candidates.
