LETTER FROM CHADBOURN.
CHADBOURN, N. C., April 27, 1906.
EDITOR DEMOCRAT:

Perhaps a letter from this place would be of interest to some of your readers. Chadbourn just a few years ago was only a small place with one or two stores and a Saw Mill. The engineers who passed scarcely blew the whistle for a stop, but to day it is a place known through all the Union as the greatest strawberry center in the South. Here the Convoy Branch crosses the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, and from this point all the berries that are made in this great trucking country are loaded in Refrigerator cars. The cars are iced here preparatory for their long journey to all parts of the north. This work requires a large number of laborers, who work all day and all night. The berry station is only fifty yards from my room and as I write this I hear the song of the negroes who are happy and contented as they draw twelve and a half cents an hour from the pockets of the Refrigerator Company. The noon train to day brought in five car loads of negroes to pick berries, and this is only the beginning of the berry season. Every day from this on they will come by the car load every day. The magnitude of the berry business at this place will have to be seen to be believed. There is a farm just two miles from this place that will require one thousand hands to gather the berry crop, while there are plenty of others who will take from one to three hundred if they can get them.

By May first there will be shipped from this point from fifty to seventy-five cars of berries every day until June first. There can be seen on the streets here by May first from five to ten thousand people at one time from every state in the Union and Canada too—people of all kinds and colors; negroes as black as Hades and as mean as the Boss of that noted place, but they draw in the yankee money, therefore they are happy and love to come here. They sing and dance and ride the "Hobby Horses," and spend money and steal and eat straw berries all day and make night hideous with their noise.

The three Hotels here are crowded to their capacity with northern buyers, while the private houses are nearly all taking and caring for people from all points of the compass. It will soon be so that one can scarcely find a place to lay his head.

But, money here is dead easy if a fellow can just get in the swim. These yankees love to spend it if you can tickle their fancy. Last night one of those Inky clouds that I used to write about arose and kept coming this way. I thought perhaps it would go around by Wilmington but it was scheduled for Chadbourn, and it came here in great shape. I could hear the people in church singing and good Lord how I did wish I had been there too, but I couldn't make it, but I promised myself to go next Sunday night if the moon didn't shine. The lightning flashed, the thunder rolled. I prayed for JULE COVINGTON and the yankees and the Dispensary and prohibition, and I am afraid I paid for Ben Tillman and the investigating committee too. If I did, I hope the good Lord will forgive me, for a scared dog is bound to fight his enemies when you get him cornered, and I was certainly cornered last night. I was awfully sorry for JULE, but maybe it didn't thunder at McColl. If I can find a place where it doesn't, I am going there at once. I am O. K. now. The weather is cool, not a cloud in sight, everything on my side. How long it will last I can't say. I am like the cat, I will come back when the berry season is over. This is not my abiding place, it is too close to deep water.

Will write again soon if I don't get scared to death down here.

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1907.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Bennettsville and by authority of the same, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied, and shall be paid into the treasury for the use of the said Town:

SEC. 1. Fifteen cents on every one hundred dollars worth of real and personal property situated within the corporate limits of said town, which tax must be paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1907, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

SEC. 2. That twenty-one (21) cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of the assessed value of all real and personal property, to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Charleston, Sumter and Northern Railroad, in accordance with the Act authorizing the same, approved December 23d, 1891, and the further sum of 6 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, as provided by the above act, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1907, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

SEC. 3. That Eighteen cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of assessed value of all real and personal property to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Electric Light Bonds for the town of Bennettsville, in accordance with the Acts of the General Assembly of S. C., authorizing the same, and the further sum of 8 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1907, and all taxes not paid at the time above stipulated a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

License Ordinance Town of Bennettsville, S. C. For Year Ending April 1907.

An Ordinance for the purpose of raising funds to pay current expenses and existing indebtedness of the Town of Bennettsville, S. C., by requiring the payment of a License Tax for the year 1906 by persons or corporations engaged or intending to engage in any calling, business, occupation or profession, in whole or in part, in said Town, as may herein be specified, and to provide a penalty for neglect or refusal to pay such License Tax:

Whereas the present revenue of the Town of Bennettsville from the taxation of property and other sources, is inadequate to pay all the current expenses and demands obligations of the Town and Whereas by act of the General Assembly of South Carolina, the cities and towns of said State are authorized annually to require the payment of such reasonable sum or sums of money as a License Tax, by any person or persons engaged or intending to engage in any calling, business or occupation, in whole or in part, within the limits of such cities or towns in said State, except ministers of the gospel and teachers, and to pass such Ordinances as are necessary to carry the provisions of the said Act into effect.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power thus granted to us, and for the purpose of increasing the revenue of the Town to a sufficient amount,

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Bennettsville and by authority of the same,

Section I. That any person or persons engaged in any calling, business, occupation or profession, in whole or in part, within the limits of the Town of Bennettsville, as may hereafter be specified, shall obtain on or before the 1st day of July 1906 a license therefor, before entering into such calling, business, profession or occupation, as are hereinafter specified.

Section II. That any person or persons engaged in any calling, business, profession or occupation for which a license is required, shall apply to the Clerk and Treasurer of the Town of Bennettsville for the same, by whom all such licenses shall be issued, and shall at the time of applying make and sign a written statement and file it with the said Clerk and Treasurer setting forth:

1st, His, her or its name or style, and in case of a firm or company, the names of the several persons constituting such firm or company.

2nd, The calling, business, profession or occupation for which license is required.

Whereupon the Clerk and Treasurer shall, upon payment of the proper tax, issue the required license. Nothing hereinafter contained shall in any manner affect any other requirement of law elsewhere enacted or ordained in regard to any calling, business, profession or occupation.

Section III. If any person or persons or corporation shall exercise or carry on any calling, business, profession or occupation for which a license is required, without having obtained the same, he, she or it shall be liable to a license tax and penalty shall be recovered in the manner hereinafter prescribed, and if any person or persons or corporation required to do so by the terms of this ordinance shall refuse or neglect to make out and deliver to the Clerk and Treasurer of the Town of Bennettsville on or before the time hereinafter required the statement provided for by Section II of this Ordinance, or shall make a false statement or shall refuse to take and subscribe an oath or affirmation as to the truth of such statements, or any part thereof, or from any cause shall fail to take out such license as may be required by this ordinance, the said Clerk and Treasurer shall report the case to the Mayor, who shall proceed to ascertain as nearly as possible the business of such person or persons or corporation, for which he, she or it may be liable to a license tax therefor, and in case of default, for the purpose of such investigation the said Clerk and Treasurer shall notify the person or persons or corporation to appear before the Mayor at his office at a time stated in said notice, and also such other person or persons as he or she or it may desire to examine, and the party sought to be charged with such license tax, if he shall attend, together with any witness called as aforesaid, shall be examined by the Mayor under oath or affirmation, and upon the nature of the business of such party and everything which may evince the amount of license tax for which such party shall be liable. From the information thus acquired, the Mayor shall find and assess the amount of license tax by such party, whether he, she or it may have attended the investigation or not, and shall add thereto a penalty of 20 per cent thereon, and with the license tax and penalty he shall within ten days thereafter, the said Clerk and Treasurer shall issue an execution therefor under his hand and the seal of the Town of Bennettsville directed to the Sheriff of Marlboro County, in said State, and the said Sheriff shall proceed to collect the said license tax and penalty by levy and sale of real and personal property as now provided by law, for the collection of taxes, together with an additional five per cent of the whole amount, which shall be the Sheriff's compensation for making such collection in addition to one dollar for making such levy, which shall be paid by the delinquent without entry or mileage fees: Provided, however, that any person or corporation shall have the right to appeal to the Town Council of Bennettsville (notice of such appeal having been given to the Clerk and Treasurer within five days after the time at which such assessment of license tax and penalty shall have been made) and upon hearing such appeal the said Council shall make such order therein as shall seem just and proper, and provided further, that in lieu of the appeal above in this section set forth to enforce payment, an action or actions may be brought by the Town of Bennettsville in any court of competent jurisdiction for the recovery of said license tax and the penalties thereon, and provided further, that any person, persons or corporation who shall carry on, or attempt to carry on any calling, business, profession or occupation without a license as herein required, and who neglect or refuse to give the information required, or to answer such questions as may be required of who shall fail to attend before the Mayor to be examined by him when so required, as provided in Sections II and III, of this Ordinance, may be deemed guilty of a violation of the same, and the Mayor or Council, may be fined not more than one hundred dollars or be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. IV. That all licenses granted under this ordinance shall be posted in a conspicuous place, except in case of vehicles for hire, which vehicles shall have placed upon them metal badges, with the number of badge and the license year marked thereon, such badges to be furnished by the Clerk and Treasurer upon payment of the license tax. Failure to keep such a badge upon such vehicle shall subject the person owning or using the same to a penalty of not more than five dollars or imprisonment not more than ten days upon conviction thereof. The license granted under this ordinance shall at all times be subject to inspection by an officer of the Town of Bennettsville, and no calling, profession or occupation shall be carried on elsewhere than at the place named in the license therefor, unless authority be granted by the Clerk and Treasurer, which authority shall be endorsed on the license.

Sec. V. All licenses granted under this ordinance shall continue in effect until the 1st day of May, 1907, except such as are provided for herein for a shorter period.

Sec. VI. All applications for license shall be made to the said Clerk and Treasurer, who shall keep a correct record of all licenses issued, and all monies received therefor, which monies shall be applied in payment of current expenses and existing indebtedness of the Town of Bennettsville, or to any other purpose.

Sec. VII. The following shall be the amount of money required to be paid to the said Clerk and Treasurer for a license to carry on any business, calling, profession or occupation, in whole or in part, within the limits of the Town of Bennettsville, as such case appears, viz:
