According to the election returns for governor, which are published in full in another column, the prohibi tionists hold the balance of power the four dispensary candidates goes to Mr. Manning in the sec. nd primary, which is a reasonable presump tion, as it is thought he must more nearly represent their views on the dispensary question than Mr. Ansel Mr. Manning would have 45 772 otes, lacking 2 614 votes to elect him. Can he draw these from the prohibition vote is the question? Mr. Manning

as is well known favors a reformed depensary controlled by the State In the first primary Mr. Ansel received 39 131 votes, lacking onl, 9 25 votes to elect him. Supp sing that Il who voved for him in the first pri mary will again vote for him in the second, Mr. Ansel would have to ge from the prohibition vote 9 255 to elect him. If he can do this ne will be the next governor of South Caroina. Mr. Ansel received 15 923 nore votes than Mr. Manning did, and, if it was not for the fact that Bleass. Sloan and McMahan, who received 22 564 votes, are in favor of the State dispensary the same as Mr. Manning s, and that their vote will probably co to Mr Manning, Mr. Ansel's election would be a foregone conclusion. It will thus be seen that the prohibition vote is the determining factor,

as we said above.
The question is how will the prohipitionists vite?
