AN ORDINANCE

To Prevent the offering for sale, or the soliciting the purchase of, any spirituous, malt or other alcoholic liquors and beverages brewed (whether lager or rice beer) or any other mixture or compound which contains alcohol and is used as a beverage, within the corporate limits of the town of Bennettsville:

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Bennettsville in Council assembled and by authority of the same:

That no person or persons, firm or corporation, shall at any time within the limits of the Town of Bennettsville, offer for sale, barter or exchange or solicit the purchase of, any spirituous, malt, vinous, fermented, brewed (whether lager or rice beer), or any other liquors and beverages or any compound or mixture thereof which contains alcohol and is used as a beverage, whether for present or future delivery, and any person, firm or corporation who shall violate this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than Five Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars, or be imprisoned not less than Five Days nor more than Thirty Days.

Done and ratified in Council assembled under the corporate seal of said Town this 14th day of June, A. D., 1907.

AN ORDINANCE
 Requiring Railroad Companies having track within the Town of Bennettsville, upon twenty days notice in writing given by the Town Council to maintain and construct a Crossing in the manner required by the said Council, at the place or places where the track of said Railroad crosses any of the streets of the Town, and to provide a punishment for any violation of said Ordinance:

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Bennettsville in Council assembled, and by authority of the same:

That all railroad companies having track within the corporate limits of the Town of Bennettsville, shall within twenty days after written notice given by the Town Council to such railroad company, maintain and construct a railroad crossing in the manner required by the Council, at the place where the track of such railroad crosses any of the streets of the Town of Bennettsville, and constantly maintained alongside of each street, where the same is crossed by the railroad. Said sign shall be elevated so as to be easily seen by travellers, and on each side of the same shall be printed in large letters, the words, "RAILROAD CROSSING"; and any railroad company upon conviction for violating this Ordinance, shall be fined not less than Five Dollars, and not more than One Hundred Dollars.

AN ORDINANCE
 To Raise Supplies For the Year Ending April 30, 1907

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Bennettsville and by authority of the same, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied, and shall be paid into the treasury for the use of the said Town.

Section 1. Fifteen cents on every one hundred dollars worth of real and personal property situate within the corporate limits of said town, which tax shall be paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1908, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 2. That twenty-one (21) cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of the assessed value of all real and personal property, to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Charleston, Northern and Southern Railroad, in accordance with the Act authorizing the same, approved December 23d, 1891, and the further sum of 6 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, as provided by the above act, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1908, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 3. That eighteen cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of assessed value of all real and personal property to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Electric Light Bonds for the town of Bennettsville, in accordance with the Acts of the General Assembly of S. C., authorizing the same; and the further sum of 6 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1908 and all taxes not paid at the time above stipulated a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 4. That all persons liable to work on the streets, sidewalks and ways of the Town of Bennettsville shall be assessed such duty for twelve months, commencing on the first day of May, 1907, by paying to the Clerk of Council a commutation tax therefor of TWO DOLLARS on or before the first day of July A. D. 1907. All persons failing to pay said commutation tax here provided for, shall, in the time specified or who shall refuse or fail to work on said streets, sidewalks or ways at any time or times when a summons shall be laid to order of the Council, shall be subject to a fine of TWO DOLLARS for each and every day of such refusal or failure to work, or imprisonment not over 30 days.

AN ORDINANCE
 To Raise Supplies For the Year Ending April 30, 1907

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Bennettsville and by authority of the same, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied, and shall be paid into the treasury for the use of the said Town.

Section 1. Fifteen cents on every one hundred dollars worth of real and personal property situate within the corporate limits of said town, which tax shall be paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1908, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 2. That twenty-one (21) cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of the assessed value of all real and personal property, to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Charleston, Northern and Southern Railroad, in accordance with the Act authorizing the same, approved December 23d, 1891, and the further sum of 6 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, as provided by the above act, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1908, and on all taxes not paid by that time a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 3. That eighteen cents be levied on every one hundred dollars of assessed value of all real and personal property to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Electric Light Bonds for the town of Bennettsville, in accordance with the Acts of the General Assembly of S. C., authorizing the same; and the further sum of 6 cents on the one hundred dollars be levied and collected for the purpose of providing for the sinking fund, which taxes must be paid on or before January 1st, 1908 and all taxes not paid at the time above stipulated a penalty of 50 per cent will be added and collected.

Sec. 4. That all persons liable to work on the streets, sidewalks and ways of the Town of Bennettsville shall be assessed such duty for twelve months, commencing on the first day of May, 1907, by paying to the Clerk of Council a commutation tax therefor of TWO DOLLARS on or before the first day of July A. D. 1907. All persons failing to pay said commutation tax here provided for, shall, in the time specified or who shall refuse or fail to work on said streets, sidewalks or ways at any time or times when a summons shall be laid to order of the Council, shall be subject to a fine of TWO DOLLARS for each and every day of such refusal or failure to work, or imprisonment not over 30 days.
