EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER, HE following preamble and resolutions, adopted by the Governor and Council,

have been ordered to be published: Whereas information has reached the Governor and Council that sundry small vessels have, from time to time, carried from the port of Charleston cargoes of cotton, which the Governor and Council have reason to believe have found their way to the enemy, and which certainly have not brought back return cargoes of arms, munitions or army

supplies; therefore,

Besolved, That during the continuance of the present blockade the exportation of cotton from any port in South Carolina is hereby prohibited, unless by the express permission of the Confederate or State authorities.

Resolved, That an agent, resident in the city of Charleston, be appointed, who shall be authorized to grant permission for the exportation of cotton on the terms hereinafter prescribed, to wit: Affidavit shall be made that no part of the cotton exported shall, with the consent or connivance of the exporter, find its way into the possession of the enemy; and bond, with good surety, shall be given that the full amount of the nett proeeeds of the sale of said cotton shall be brought back into the Confederate States in arms, munitions of war or army supplies. unless prevented by successful interposition

Whereas it has been represented to the Governor and Council that persons in this State, -representing themselves as agents of the Government for the purchase of provis-ions, have bought considerable supplies from the patriotic and unsuspecting citizens of this State, and turned there over to the Government at large profits; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Governor and Council, That hereafter any person falsely represent-ing himself as agent of the Confederate or State Government for the purchase of supplies of provisions, who shall actually pur-chace as such agent, shall be liable to arrest as a disloyal and disaffected person, and committed to Jail by the Chief of Justice and Police, on proper information being given to

Resolved further. That any person who has heretofore or may hereafter purchase provisions and supplies, representing himself as agent of the Government, who shall demand or receive from the Government or others a higher price therefor than the actual cost and expenses thereof, shall be liable to like arrest and imprisonment, and all provisions so purchased shall be seized and turned over to the Government at a reasonable price

MIE following rules have been this day adopted by the Governor and Council for the management of the Department of Construction and Manufactures, to which Department the Hon. W. H. Gist has been adopted by the Governor and Council assigned as Chief:

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSTRUC-TION AND MANUFACTURES.

RULE 1. The Chief of Construction and Manufactures shall have the charge and con-trol of all the Foundries and Work-shops and other places for manufacturing arms and munitions of war and the repairs of the same and shall keep a record in his office of all written contracts made by the General Superintendent or himself; and he is instructed, as general rule, to cause all contracts to be made in writing and filed in his office, and a copy thereof sent to the Ordinance Depart-Rock zi-R. shall be the of the Department of Construction and Manu-factures to make or approve all purchases of land, lots or sites for erecting Foundries or other public works, and all machinery, tools, lumber and other materials necessary for such purposes. In all purchases requiring the expenditure of large sums of money, he shall be required, if practicable, to get the previous consent of the Governor and Council, and he shall from time to time make a report of his action to them.

RULE 3 .- h shall require the General Superintendent, and any other agent intrusted with the expenditure of money, to submit to him estimates in detail, setting forth such articles, as far as practicable, as he or they may desire to purchase, with the probable cost; and if he approves the said estimates, he shall then submit them to the Governor and Council for their action.

RULE 4 .- He shall require all vouchers for money expended to be submitted to him, to be examined and approved, and shall then hand them over to the Chief of the Treasury and Finance, to be filed in his office

EXECUTINE OFFICE, March 12, 1862. HEREAS, the enemy have cut off, to a large extent, our usual resources for breadstuffs, by the occupation of Pamlico Sound and the waters of the lower Roanoke on one side, and by the occupation of Nashville and Kentucky on the other side; and whereas, it is of the last importance to us that a large supply of provisions shall be produced amongst ourselves, to support our brave men in the field and to supply their helpless families left at home.

Now, then, be it known, that I, as Governor of South Carolina, with the earnest approbation of the Executive Council, do hereby issue this my proclamation, calling upon all good citizens, by every appeal that can inflaence a faithful and patriotic people, to abstain from planting, at most, not more than one fifth of their usual crop of cotton, and to plant a large crop of grain. By so doing, we place ourselves upon the surest foundations of independence, and put it beyond the power of our enemies to obtain any large supply of that article so essential in the commerce of nodern nations, except by the ordinary mode of an uninterrupted trade with an independent people.

Cotton is an article which comes nearer to gold and silver, in the adjustment of balances between nations, than any other production; because, with the exception of costs as to transportation, it has nearly universality of demand and universality of value, and is not perishable. Unless it can be procured by treating those who produce it with equality in their intercourse with other nations, then we should refuse to produce it and determine to destroy what we have if necessary. To control this power effectually to our advantage, there must be concert of action, and I earnestly entreat every patriotic man to comply, for at least one crop, with the suggestion

The wealthy farmers owe it to the wives, daughters and sisters of our brave soldiers of the field to raise enough provisions not only for themselves, but to see that there is no want around the homes of our gallant men who are in active service. The enemy threatens a large portion of the rice-growing region of our State. This source of supply, which has heretofore been so abundant and so essential in our domestic economy, may be largely diminished and this is an additional reason why every planter in the interior should enlarge his crop of breadstuffs. We have all the means of productive supplies within ourselves, and now is the time to enlarge all those supplies so essential to the support of our armies, and so necessary to
