When children are not trained to give as a part of worship, need it be a matter of surprise that as active members in later years they attempt to worship Him without an offering. As training is necessary in securing regular attendance, so training must not be forgotten that the future generation may be lacking in no part of worship. We wish the congregation abundant success in this new departure and long for the time when more congregations will incorporate both of these ideas in their plans for Christian service.

Rev. D. P. T. Crickenberger, formerly serving most acceptably in the Virginia Synod, has been in his new field at DuBois, Pa., since February 14, 1901, where the cordiality with which he was greeted by his people has extended throughout the year. His work has borne fruitful results in 27 accessions to the congregation—nearly all of the new members being heads of families and prominent citizens—with two catechetical classes numbering 39 members now under instruction, and confirmations among them to take place at Easter. Many expressions of good will have been shown Pastor Crickenberger. Twice has the congregation made him donations of considerable value in substantial and at Christmas the council made him a very handsome gift. On New Year's day the congregation met and voted an increase of \$100 in his salary, to take effect January 1st—all done unanimously and without previous knowledge or solicitation of the pastor. Such evidences of appreciation, together with the existence of unity and harmony in the congregation, make much for the welfare of the Master's cause.

The pastor has been remembered by these kind people who know how to take care of their pastor. St. John's and Frieden's congregations presented the pastor with a very fine suit of clothes—a very handsome Christmas present indeed. May God bless these kind donors and give them a prosperous New Year from beginning to end. Unity and concord abide with us and there is harmony between pastor and people. We have a class of catechumens ready for confirmation at Easter.
