Bail Granted.

The town authorities had to take W. M. Parker before Associate Justice Woods at Marion under a rule to show cause in habeas corpus proceedings. Mr. Parker had been tried for violation of the vaccination ordinance and sentenced to thirty days confinement in the jail. His attorney had instituted habeas corpus proceedings and for some reason at the time fixed for a hearing before Justice Woods the writ was not returned. On the return to the rule to show cause, the case was argued on its merits and Judge Woods allowed him bail, pending his appeal from the Mayor's order in the sum of two hundred dollars. The order was sent over on last Tuesday and Parker made his bond. The order of Judge Woods does not decide the question whether or not the town has the right to enforce vaccination—it only allows bail pending the appeal which Mr. Parker has taken to the court of General Sessions, and which appeal will be heard next week. It is an interesting question and will doubtless create interest in the trial and arguments.

An investigation was held last Saturday in the court of Magistrate Joseph W. Johnson in the case of Julius T. Hatcher, who is charged in the warrant as being of the negro race and intermarrying with a white girl. Absolutely no proof was made showing the presence of negro blood in Hatcher's veins, but he was bound over to the court of General Sessions along with the Rev. Carroll who married them. The girl who married Hatcher was not included in the warrant.

Those who are acquainted with all the circumstances of the case, regret very much that such a prosecution had been brought, because they see no good that can come from it. C. T. Hardee is the prosecutor and he married a sister of the girl who has married Hatcher. Some three or four years before Hardee married his wife, William Hatcher, a brother of Julius Hatcher, married another of his sisters, and Hardee a 'mish' that he has associated with William Hatcher as a white man. The Hatchers are a dark-skinned people, but if there is any negro blood in them, no one knows whence or when it got there—if anything it may be Indian or Spaniard. But they are good citizens, perfectly honest, industrious and hard working people. To this the business men who have had dealings with them will testify. There are those who will testify that the girl in the case is not of the high social standing, that she too is of a dark complexion, and should it be admitted for a minute that Hatcher is tainted with negro blood, yet the fact that he sought a wife among those of his own class, will be his best defense. If he had attempted to marry a white girl of high social standing, his case would be different in the opinion of the people.

Farmers Called to Meet.

The farmers of the county are requested to meet at the various voting precincts next Saturday for the purpose of selecting two or more delegates to meet in Conway at 12 o'clock on Monday of Court week to select the delegates to represent the County at the Cotton Growers' Convention in Columbia. The convention comes off in Columbia on Tuesday, February 21st, and the delegates elected to represent the county will have to leave for that city on the evening train on Monday. The purpose of these conventions is to organize the farmers and to control the production of cotton and to control the placing of the cotton of the South on the market. It is one of the most important moves ever made for the benefit of the farmers, and in it, not only the farmers, but all other business men are interested and will lend a helping hand. We trust that Horry County is behind the other counties in the movement and that she will have her delegates on hand with the others. This is short notice, but the meeting can be held and the delegates sent just the same if action be taken at once.

Court Next Week.

The court of General Sessions will convene here next Monday morning, and a glance at the criminal docket will likely be but little time to devote to the transaction of civil business. There are two murder cases on the docket to be tried, viz: State vs. Bell and State vs. Foley. Besides these there is the usual number of cases for minor offenses to be tried and which will occupy fully the first few days of the court. I will likely take until mid day on Thursday, or perhaps until Friday morning, to dispose of the criminal cases, and after this there will be but little time for other business. This state of affairs is bad in view of the present congested state of the civil docket here, and a special term of considerable length will be needed next summer or fall to clean up the business. Last year one entire week was consumed in the trial of one civil jury case. Without a special term the dockets will never be cleared.
