Pride and jealousy started the Eu-

knows how long.

Authorities in cities and town  
hardly ever act in time in case of em-  
ergency. In case of small pox or  
other epidemic disease, they usually  
wait until the disease has spread  
through several communities before  
taking precautions. The time to act  
is at first, and it is their duty to do  
that.

We have believed all of the time  
that the only way the United States  
could keep from being seriously involv-  
ed in the European war was for each  
individual citizen to be careful how he  
conducted himself in reference to the  
countries at war with each other. Why  
should the one hundred and ninety  
Americans take passage as they did  
on the Cunard Liner Lusitania? Why  
could they not see that they might  
not only endanger their own lives, but  
might bring about conditions that  
would cause this country to face a  
grave situation? Each American citi-  
zen must act with good judgment  
and be careful what he does if he  
would keep his country out of the  
struggle.

It is indeed a hard thing for the  
American people to remain calm,  
when a British steamer carrying

about 200 Americans is sunk in mid-  
ocean without warning by a German  
submarine. Out of the Americans on  
board at least seventy-three lost their  
lives. On the other hand a very  
learned man said, speaking of this dis-  
aster, that the men taking passage on  
the ship had been warned, not only by  
advertisements in the newspaper  
in New York, but by private notes  
and that since Germany had declared  
a war zone round the British Isles  
the passages on board the liner were  
the same as on British soil; and he  
holds up the contrast to the effect  
that if these people had been on Brit-  
ish soil where they chose to remain  
while Germany made an attack on the  
place, that if they lost their lives be-  
cause of this fool hardy conduct the Ger-  
man government could not under those cir-  
cumstances be held responsible. There  
is much in this argument.


