MEETING OF CONWAY COUNCIL OF DEFENSE

Pursuant to a call of the Chairman, a meeting of the Conway Division of the Council of Defense was held at the Club Rooms on Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The organization was perfected by the election of D. A. Spivey, Chairman, and Miss Ella Sessions, Secretary. The Chairman briefly stated the object of the meeting and outlined the proposed purpose of the organization.

It was noted with pleasure the splendid work being done by the women in the matter of the Red Cross, and their consideration shown the Soldiers selected from Horry County. A resolution was passed commending them for their patriotic services being rendered.

The work being done by the various churches and allied institutions, through their Pastors and leaders, was specially commended as doing their part in creating public sentiment and infusing a patriotic spirit among our people.

The Chairman of the Division of the Press was not present, but the liberal action of the County Press speaks for itself. They are doing more than their part in publishing the news and disseminating knowledge relative to the war.

Mr. Baker, Chairman of the Professional Men's Division, delivered a brief address in which he made several splendid suggestions, and pledging his efforts along the line of organization and agitation.

Chesley D. Jones, Chairman of the Negro's Department, reported that the members of his race were thorough alive and in sympathy with the objects of the war; and in hearty accord with the Government in its efforts to win in this great conflict.

The Teachers and school officers were urged to organize the children along the lines laid down in the splendid address of President Wilson. We need even the cooperation and enthusiasm of the children as well as their parents. Periodical lectures to the pupils will do much towards bringing this about.

The Banks of the County were heartily commended for the able assistance rendered in the matter of selling Liberty Bonds and raising Red Cross funds, as well as the liberal manner in which they have been conducting their business during these critical times.

Mr. Anderson, of the Manufacturing Division, said his regrets at not being able to attend this meeting, but pledging his assistance in any way to aid the Organization and help the cause at large.

As a most practical aid to "defense" Mr. Spivey was urged to push the proposed organization of a Home Guard for Horry County. He stated that the matter was now being taken up by the Governor, and that he believed that Horry would be allowed one of the proposed new Companies of the 3rd Regiment. He further stated that he had been working along this line for several months, and it is now seemed that the plan would be completed within a few weeks.

A resolution was passed asking all our members and the public at large to attend the County meeting to be held on Saturday the 29th at the Burroughs School.

After various comments endorsing and encouraging the organization, the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chairman. Official: D. A. SPIVEY, Chairman. Ella Sessions, Secretary.
