GERMANS RATIFY THE PEACE TREATY

National Assembly Versailles Pact Effective Law

ALLIES MAY RAISE BLOCKADE AT ONCE

Treaty Goes Into Effect With Them When the Three Have Ratified.

Berlin .- The German national assembly in Weimar has adopted a resolution ratifying the peace treaty according to advices received here.

The resolution reads:

"The peace treaty signed on June 28, 1919, as well as the protocol, an nexed and special agreements on military occupation of the Rhineland are hereby ratified. This law becomes ef fective from the date of its promulgation."

Ratification of the peace treaty by the German national assembly removes all doubt of the acceptance of the terms by Germany.

The national assembly by ratifying the treaty makes it possible for the allied and associated powers to raise the blockade.

Official notification was sent Germany June 29, that the blockade was looked upon in peace conference circles as a sure plan for securing speedy ratification by Germany.

The council of five on Monday decided to lift the commercial censorship on communications with Germany simultaneous with the removal of the blockade.

When three of the principal allied powers, in addition to Germany, have ratified the treaty it becomes effective for those who have ratified it. After Germany and the three allied powers have ratified it, the treaty will come into force for each other J. Sarvis lands, containing fifty (50) power on the \ day when it notifies the peace conference secretariat of its ratifacation.

The resolution adopted by the allied council concerning the blockade was as follows:

The superior blockade council is instructed to base its arrangements for rescinding restriction upon trade with Germany upon the assumption that the allied and associated powers will now wait to raise the blockade until the completion of ratification, as provided for at the end of the treaty with Germany, but that it is to be raised immediately upon receipt of information that the treaty of peace has been ratified by Germany.'

Promulgation of the resolution ratifying the treaty is dependent upon the sigining of the resolution by Presdient Ebert.

The Germantional assembly is the first elective body in any country whose representatives signed the treaty to adopt ratifying resolution. The treaty probably will be laid before the British, French and
