The work on the good road from Homewood to Bayboro is now about wound up according to the plans made by the authorities long ago when the work was commenced. As soon as the work there has been completed, then it is proposed to start the work here on the southern end of the national highway.

The idea entertained by some is that the steel bridge across the Kingsford lake must be scrapped and a better passage way made there for the accumulating traffic. The bridge parts they say can be moved and used on the upper Waccamaw River at Star Bluff, or at Bellamy's or Mulberry Landings.

All of the people know that they need good roads. It is not all of them that seem willing to pay the cost. This matter of cost is something that is inevitable. It is no use to grumble at the expense. We have got to stand it.
