MAY GET LIEN UPON TOBACCO

After Signing the Cooperative Marketing Contract Says Davis

SOME ONE HAS TOLD IT WRONG

Association Will Make it Easier to Get Credit on Tobacco Crops

Someone has given Horry County farmers the idea that when they sign the Co-operative Marketing contract they cannot give a crop lien on tobacco because they have already signed away their crop. This idea is absolutely wrong. Article 13 of the contract states, "You may make a crop mortgage. The association will try to help you secure standard terms." A member of the Association should have an easier time getting a lien as the Association protects the merchant in payment of the lien. The merchant has his advances to the farmer secured by the Association (Article 13, section c) rather than by an individual. Another incorrect statement has been made that a farmer cannot draw a cash advance on his tobacco upon delivery without giving a mortgage on other property. This statement is incorrect and was made by some one trying to injure the co-operative movement. There is nothing in the contract to warrant this statement. As soon as a farmer delivers his tobacco and it is graded he is given a warehouse receipt and can draw a cash advance upon this receipt alone, as part payment for his tobacco. The balance to be paid as soon as the tobacco is sold. For any other information about co-operative marketing see your county agent and remember the sign as campaign closes Jan. 1st. Be sure to sign up before that time.


