

GET PUREBRED DAIRY BULL

Clemson College.—The two reasons for so many unprofitable cows in South Carolina are lack of proper care and lack of good breeding.

In the first place, on the average farm cows are not cared for properly. They are not fed the proper amount of feeds and the rations are not balanced.

In the second place, there are being kept too many cows which could not be made profitable even if given the best opportunity by way of feed, care and treatment.

This is the season to breed the cows for next fall calving. If the money to buy a good bull is a hindering factor in the case, it will pay to sell enough cows to pay for a good bull.

Washington.—The day when American farm products will be as extensively advertised throughout the country as the automobile and other manufactured articles, will soon arrive.

"The American farmer has been acquainted with only one side of the advertising business," he said. "In the main, he thinks of advertising as a more or less tricky device employed by middlemen to separate him from his money."

"The signs of the times, however, are pointing in another direction. Bankers and members of chambers of commerce have begun to take the farmer in as a business partner. They are seeing that they must help him earn more money, and they are beginning to see that he needs help principally with his marketing and selling problems."

"The selling end of the farmer's business has been badly and most unfortunately neglected. Circumstances are to blame in part, he is to blame in part, and business men are to blame in part. In a certain sense, advertising men are much to blame. Problems in marketing, advertising and selling that need solution much more than many which have been solved, have been neglected."

ONE BIG WEEK ON EDUCATION

The President of the United States has designated as American Education Week December 3rd, to 9th.

Governor Harvey has also issued a Proclamation setting forth this week as Education Week for South Carolina.

The movement has behind it the U. S. Bureau of Education, the National Educational Association, the American Legion, and the South Carolina Citizens Association. More than one hundred other leading national organizations of America will join in the observance of this week.

This great movement has for its purpose the "uplift of the educational standard of the men, women and children of the United States, and the arousing of the nation to a consciousness of the importance of widespread public education along the lines of physical improvement, hygiene, American citizenship, and equality of advantages afforded to every boy and girl of our country."

Horry County is asked to perform her part in making this campaign a complete success in our State.

With this in view we ask the cooperation of all teachers, ministers, school trustees, civic organizations and all patriotic citizens in general.

The Central Committee for this county has met and organized for work. At the same time it has formulated a tentative program for the proposed program.

Each and every teacher of the county is appointed a member of the committee to act for their respective schools. Likewise each minister of the county is asked to serve on the committee for their community.

Each minister is asked to preach a sermon, or deliver a lecture Sunday the 3rd, on some phase of education, as may be applied to his particular section.

The principal of each school, along with the assistants, is requested during the week to stress the importance of better trained citizenship, improved methods, better buildings and equipment, longer terms, increased pay for instructors and the necessity for a higher standard of morals in our respective communities.

On Friday evening, December 8th, at 7:30 o'clock we ask that a mass meeting be held at each school house or community center, at which meeting all teachers, trustees, patrons and pupils are requested to attend. Efforts will be made to have suitable speakers, along with local talent to be commanded for these rallies.

On Saturday, the final day, will be the Grand Rally or County Mass Meeting at the Court House in Conway. At this final gathering everybody is invited and expected to be present.

We want every school, in command of its teachers, to be in line for the Grand Parade on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock. Accompanying each should be the patrons and trustees of their respective schools.

Prizes are to be offered for the school having the largest percentage of enrolled pupils in the parade, and for the school having the best float, or most appropriate banner for the occasion.

Notable speakers are expected on the program for the mid-day exercises to be held at the Court House. At this meeting it is proposed to perfect an educational organization and transact other important business.

Let us make this a great day for Horry, and one pointing to future progress.

HOME ORCHARDS GAINING FAVOR

Clemson College.—South Carolina farm families will eat more fruit in future years, if the scores of home orchards now being established are given reasonable care in the way of pruning, spraying, cultivation, and fertilization.

W. D. Wood, Union.—Over one hundred additional home orchards will be planted this fall, and if present plans materialize about 150 acres of peaches will be set out for commercial purposes.

C. L. Vaughan, Laurens.—Our co-operative order has reached 15,800 Elberta trees and still more are considering planting out orchards. Many home orchards will be ordered yet even if it is late. I have had many inquiries about how to care for the home orchards. It seems that the people are just now realizing that they can not raise fruit without pruning and spraying.

W. R. Gray, Clarendon.—I have been taking orders for trees for home orchards, and we will start a number of new orchards this season. Some of the others will be better cared for also.

J. M. Eleazer, Saluda.—Prices have been secured on fruit trees and some co-operative orders are in the prospect. Ten thousand peach trees have been treated for borers with paradi-chlorobenzene method. Five tons of sulphur have been ordered for the purpose of manufacturing lime-sulphur locally. Plans are being made for enlarged commercial peach plantings. Six pieces of home orchard work have been lined up for demonstrations this year.

Ernest Carnes, Spartanburg.—During this month we have assisted farmers in securing prices from reliable nurseries on peach trees and have placed orders aggregating 45,000 trees at 10 1/2 cents per tree, which I feel like is a considerable saving in the purchase of nursery stock.

Geo. R. Briggs, Oconee.—There is great interest in home orchards and more commercial apple orchards.

The Extension horticulturists are rendering great service in the establishment of both home and commercial orchards. Everything possible is being done to encourage early planting, early pruning and spraying and more attention to fertilizer.
