LAW FORBIDDING THE DESTRUCTION OF TIMBER IN EUROPE.

Government have Supervision Over Private Land as well as National and Communal Forests...

In Germany the various governments own and manage, in a conservative spirit, about one-third of the forest...

The other half of the forest property, in the hands of private owners, is managed mostly without interference...

The several states differ in their laws regarding forest property. Of the private forests 70 per cent are without any control whatever...

The tendency on the part of the government has been rather toward persuasive measures. Thus in addition to buying up or acquiring by exchange...

In Austria, by a law adopted in 1852, not only are the state forests—comprising less than 20 per cent of the total forest area—nationally managed...

Under a law adopted in Italy in 1888 the department of agriculture, in co-operation with the department of public works...

In Russia until lately liberty to cut, burn, destroy and devastate was unrestricted, but in 1888 a comprehensive and well considered law cut off...

Vance Laid to Rest.

ASHVILLE, April 18.—At the hour of noon the remains of the late Senator Zebulon B. Vance were being deposited in their last resting place overlooking the beautiful French Broad river in this "land of the sky;" a fitting spot for the last repose of the great man.

The demonstration in Asheville was the greatest of the occasion. The body was placed in the First Presbyterian church at 8 o'clock, and from that hour until 11:30, thousands of people from his native county—Buncombe—passed by to take a last look.

The procession was then formed, reaching almost from the church to the cemetery—a distance of two miles. The crowd that marched out to the cemetery is estimated at 10,000.

Friday will be observed here as Memorial day for the whole state, and an immense throng is expected.
