South Carolina's Version.

[From The Brevard News.] Josiah Chapman, jr., familiarly known as "Bud" Chapman, was the leader in an assault on John Whitmore, of this county, and was sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of 8 years at the spring term of Superior court here in 1895. He made his escape from the state farm in July, and has been hanging about his home in Pickens county, South Carolina, since that time.

On Thursday last State Agent, J. A. Perry, of Morganton, arrived in Brevard by the noon train, and had with him, J. M. Morgan, of Asheville, and J. A. Bryson, of Hendersonville. He also detailed Thos. H. Jordan, of Brevard, and at 3 o'clock that evening the posse started to Pickens to arrest the escaped convict.

Sheriff McGaha and Z. X. Smith were all ready to start to Pickens to arrest Bob Powell, whose sentence in Pickens jail would expire next day, for a bill of costs owing this county, and so they accompanied the party to Pickens. This created the impression that our sheriff was interested in the Chapman arrest, but this supposition was without foundation. Arriving at Pickens the sheriff secured his bill of costs, turned Bob Powell free and came home, arriving here at 1 o'clock Saturday morning.

At Pickens Mr. Perry was still further reinforced by the addition to his party of United States Deputy Marshal, J. J. Lewis, who had a bench warrant for the arrest of Chapman. Friday the party left Pickens for the home of Chapman, 20 miles distant, by two different routes. Arriving first on the scene Lewis set watch on the premises without making his presence suspected, and was rewarded by seeing Chapman enter his home for the night. The two wings of the searching party then got together, surrounded the house by commanding all avenues of escape and awaited their time.

At daybreak next morning they opened a parley for the surrender of the prisoner but without avail. His father, who lived near by, came to them and urged Bud to die rather than surrender, and he would get his gun and gather the neighbors to defend him. But Bud thought he saw an opening in freedom and made an exit at a back window. As he did so Perry at the corner of the house set ten feet distant with a double barrel shotgun. Bud opened fire with a H. Colt, but in his haste his arm was unsteady, and the next moment a plume of smoke entered the apartment. He started to run but a few steps farther he came face to face with Tom Jordan, who had mechanically stepped behind an ash gun. Here Chapman fired his second shot, but the gun saved Jordan from a severe if not mortal wound, as the bullet from Bud's revolver was found imbedded in the gun, not an inch from the top in direct line with Jordan's body. Jordan was also armed with a double barrel shotgun, and at this critical moment a second load of buckshot brought the exciting race to an end by terminating the mortal career of the desperado. He died almost instantly after the second shot was fired.

The arresting party then returned to Pickens and surrendered to the authorities. A coroner's jury was impaneled and after viewing the remains a verdict of justifiable homicide was rendered. The parties were bound over to the next term of Pickens Superior court in \$1,000 bonds, and the good people of Pickens seemed to vie with each other for the privilege of becoming their bondsmen.

On Tuesday the arresting party arrived here and took the evening train for their various homes. They speak in terms of praise of the treatment accorded them by the people of Pickens, and there is no doubt but there is a feeling of relief to the supporters of good government in the state line section of this and our neighboring county. Bud Chapman was known and feared as a violator of law by all law abiding citizens, and his death removes one of the obstacles to the growth and development of the section where he operated. We deeply deplore the necessity for such heroic measures, but the law must be obeyed before we can hope to attract to our mountain fastnesses the better class of citizenship. Let us obey the law.
