## SOME FAMOUS TRAGEDIES

Recalled by the Death of Phillip Barton Key in North Carolina.

Baltimore Sun. Mr. Phillip Barton Key, who died September 25th at his home, States-ville, N. C., at the age of 61 years, was a member of the Maryland Key family and a kinsman of Francis Scott Key the author of "The Star Spangled Ban-

He was born on the Key estate in St. Mary's county. After the civil war, in which he took part on the Confederate side, he settled in Louisiana, where he married a Miss Thornton. Later he removed to North Carolina, where he was engaged in the milling business. His Baltimore relatives are a brother, Mr. Edward Key, and a sister, Mrs.

George C. Jenkins. The name of Phillip Barton Key has been borne by several earlier members of the Key family. It was the name of Francis Scott Key's second youngest on, who was killed in Washington February 27th, 1859, by Gen. Daniel E. Sickles, then a Congressman from New ork, on account of Mr. Key's attention to his young wife. Mr. Key was then the United States attorney for the District of Columbia. An anonymous letter to General Sickles led to a confession on the part of his wife, and shortly afterwards Mr. Key was seen on a corner near the Sickles home making signals with a handkerchief. General Sickles took a pistol, went out rod "as a sort of myth of the Southern into the street and killed Mr. Key. He was arrested, indicted for murder, but was acquitted after a trial of twenty

Mrs. Sickles was a strikingly beautiful woman. She had been married to General Sickles six years before the tragedy, being at the time of her marriage 17 years of age. Her father was Antonio Bagioli, a famous teacher of music, who had come to this country with the first Italian opera company and subsequently made his home in Mr. Key was 39 years old New York and a widower. His wife, who was Miss Ellen Swann, of Baltimore, had

died two years before he was killed. The name of Philip Key was first porne by the founder of the family in Maryland. He came to this country in the first part of the last century, accompanied by a brother of the poet Dryden. Mr. Key obtained large grants of lands in St. Mary's, Cecil and Frederick counties from the lords pro-Frederick counties from the lords pro prietary of the province, and also had property in England. He died in 1761. Philip Barton Key was the name of

a grandson of Philip Key, who represented Maryland in Congress from 1807 to 1813. He had been loyal to the British cause in the American Revo-Intion, and his right to a seat in Congress was contested on the ground that he had lost citizenship in Maryland. Another Philip Key represented Maryland in Congress from 1791 until 1793. He was also speaker of the General Assembly of Maryland. He was a native of St. Mary's county, born in 1750, and died there in 1820.

Most of the present members of the Key family are descendants of Francis Scott Key, who was the father of eleven children. His wife was Miss Mary Taylor Lloyd, daughter of Colone! Ed ward Lloyd, of Wye House, Talbot county.

In addition to the one killed by Gen eral Sickles, another son of Franci Scott Key met with a violent death This was Daniel Murray Key, a midshipman in the United States navy, who challenged a fellow-midshipma to a duel on the historic meeting ground at Bladensburg. On the ground his opponent, Midshipman Shelburne of New Hampsbire, said: "Mr. Key, have no desire to kill you."

"No matter," replied Key, "I came to kill you." "Very well," was the reply, "then I shall kill you," and Key fell at the first shot.
