### PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

### Liquor Selling in Pickens.

Pickens, Nov. 5.—Special: There has just been closed one of the longest sessions of court that has ever been known in the county. The criminal docket was very heavy, there being four murder cases, besides many others of less importance. The sinners against the dispensary law outnumbered all the others, but the jury would convict only where there was the clearest kind of proof.

The criminal docket was cleared, however, through the efforts of Solicitor Ansel. Mr. Ansel is a candidate for the Judgeship to succeed Judge Earle, and the empire could not fall on more worthy shoulders. He is a gentleman of high scholarship and a confidant whom the people of this county would delight to see elevated to the Bench more than Mr. Ansel.

At the close of the court here this week the members of the bar expressed their high appreciation of Judge Witherspoon's services on the bench, their sincere regrets that he had decided not to longer preside over the courts of this State after his present term expires.

### Confederate Daughters' Letter to The Veterans.

SOUTH CAROLINA COLLEGE, Columbia, S. C., May 1, 1896.  
 Dear Sir: The Board of Directors of the Wide Hampton Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, carrying into effect the purpose and recent action of the Chapter, appointed the undersigned a committee to collect, preserve and exhibit, for historical and educational purposes, Confederate relics and records. The authorities of the South Carolina College have given a room in the College Library as a depository for these relics until a permanent museum for their safe-keeping can be provided.

To preserve and illustrate the history and principles of our people, and inspire our descendants with sentiments of honor for the good and great men who have glorified our State by their high character and deeds of valor, we wish to obtain for our depository relics or records from the noted Confederate leaders to our State and memorials of the military commands made up of our State Soldiers, whose names have been made illustrious by their courage and patriotic devotion.

Will you not honor us and aid our efforts by the gift or loan of some weapon, accoutrement, or other possession connected with the war, or the service you rendered the Confederacy? A brief account of any interesting incidents or association connected with the relic contributed would add greatly to its value.  
 We would prize very highly any manuscript or document letter you may have or obtain, or that you may write, as a sketch or history of any person, event, period of time, or exposition of a principle, connected with the formation of the Confederacy, or with the war waged to maintain its existence. Our depository is now ready for the reception of relics.
