A Word to The Farmers.

The following from the Atlanta Constitution strikes us as being worthy of the consideration of our farming readers: "As the cotton crop begins to mature the Constitution takes this opportunity to give some timely advice to our farmers."

Nothing can be gained by waiting for prices to rise without any definite assurance that the market is going to improve. Instead of rising, prices might take a downward tendency; and, in that event, the farmer who has not disposed of his cotton at the commencement of the season, is sure to regret his procrastination, to say the least.

From present indications the cotton crop this year is apt to be much larger than its predecessor. This does not by any means increase the likelihood of better prices later on. Our farmers should also bear in mind that cotton loses in weight while stored away in close warehouses.

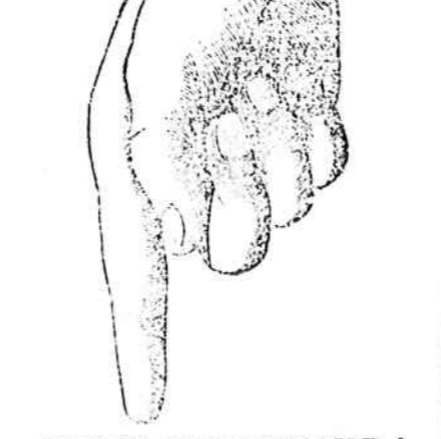

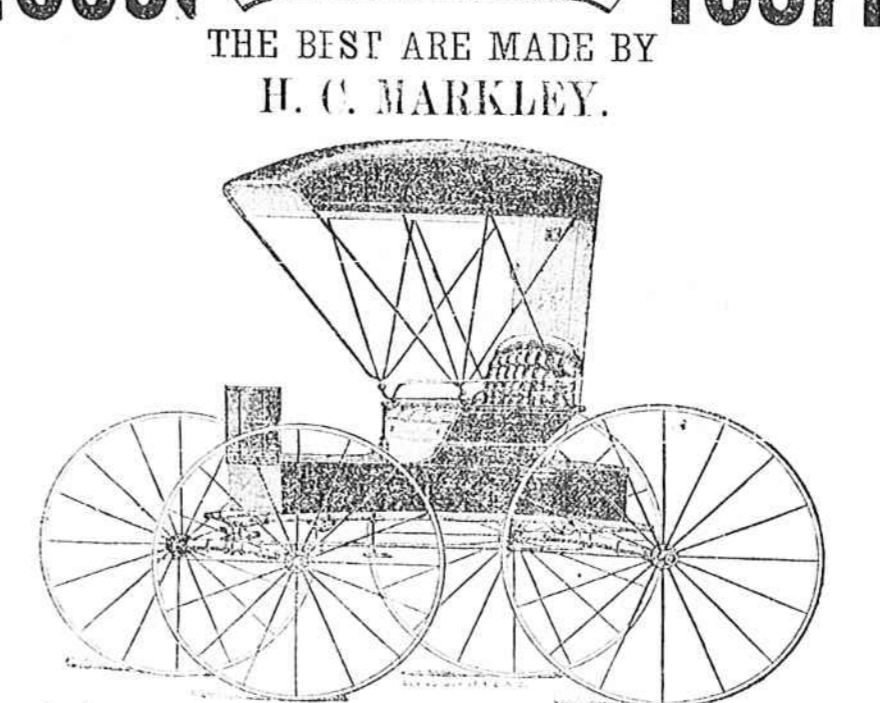
