

COTTON REPORT

Miss Sallic Geor who has been visiting relatives near Iva has returned Shows the Condition of The Crop

At Present

New York, June 30.—The marked tendency to reduce acreage in Texas and Oklahoma has chased a general reduction for the whole belt amounting to 1.7 per cent. Of the important ctates only Mississippi and Louisiana show an increase, being 4 per cent and 5 per cent, respectively.

Georgia, Alabama, Arkansas and Tennessee remain the same as last year. Owing to unfavorable conditions in the early half of the month and the general lateress of the searon the percentage of cotton advanced but slightly, being 78.6 per cent against 78.2 per cent a month ago, or an advance of 0.4 per cent. This compares with 80.9 per cent in 1913, 81.3 in 1912, 85.9 in 1911 and 80.6 for the 10 year average.

These reports are based on the replies of over 2,000 special correspondents of the Journal of Commerce, bearing an average date of June 22.
