## MANY MILLION DOLLARS LOST

### IN OPERATION OF CHICAGO, ROCK ISLAND AND PACIFIC RAILWAY.

### DISCLOSURE MADE

#### At Hearing of Interstate Commerce Commission's Investigation.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—An apparent loss of \$7,500,000 in one bond transaction, losses indefinite in amount but aggregating many millions in the acquisition of the Frisco Lines and the Chicago & Alton road and a loss of \$756,000 on the stock and bonds of the Deering Coal Company, were disclosed today at the hearing of the Interstate Commerce Commission's investigation of the financial operations of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad. Only two witnesses were examined.

Frederick C. Sharwood, an examiner of accounts for the commission, gave in detail the results of his investigation of the books of the system consisting of the operating company and the two holding companies.

Mr. Sharwood testified as to the salaries received by various officers. As chairman of the board, R. R. Cable received annually from \$24,000 to \$32,000; W. B. Leeds, as president, received also \$24,000 for a time and later \$32,000 a year. B. L. Winchell, as third vice president, was paid \$25,000 a year and as president \$40,000; B. F. Yoakum, as chairman of the board, was paid \$30,000 a year, and L. F. Loree received \$317,000.

A voucher for \$25,000, the proceeds of which were paid to Robert Mather, counsel for the railway company, was offered in evidence.

The index shows that the amount was paid for campaign purposes, said the witness, "but I was unable to find the correspondence file respecting the matter. The file had disappeared."

Two other vouchers for \$10,000 each also were offered in evidence. No information was obtainable as to the use to which that money had been put, Sharwood said.

Describing the acquisition of the St. Louis, Kansas City & Colorado road by the Rock Island in 1902, Sharwood said, David R. Francis and John Scullion, of St. Louis gave \$2,000,000 in Rock Island stock for \$3,030,000 in St. Louis, Kansas City bonds and that the Rock Island also assumed an indebtedness of \$4,500,000 from the absorbed road.

The average cost of that line to the Rock Island," he added, "was \$57,958 a mile."

"That of course, includes St. Louis Terminal facilities and trackage over the Washburn," suggested counsel for the Rock Island.

"Of course," said Sharwood.

F. L. Hine, president of the First National Bank of New York, a director in all three Rock Island companies, was the only other witness. He said he became director of the Rock Island Railway in 1902 on invitation of William H. Moore and admitted that the vote that stood in his name actually was the property of Judge Moore.

Mr. Hine said he heartily approved of the sale of the Frisco stock to B. F. Yoakum and his associates, although the transactions entailed a considerable loss. He explained the transaction by which a loan of \$7,500,000 was obtained by the Rock Island of New Jersey through the First National Bank of New York, the bank participating to the extent of \$1,250,000.

"We received," said the witness, "our pro rata share of the \$135,000 paid for the loan. Our bank could not legally have made the entire loan of \$7,500,000."

The only source of income of the two holding companies was the Rock Island Operating Company, the witness said, which had exchanged through its stockholders about \$71,000,000 of stock for nearly five times that amount in securities of the holding companies. Stockholders owning about \$4,000,000 Rock Island operating stock refused to exchange.

"What consideration as a director, did you give those minority stockholders?" inquired Commissioner Clements.

"I never looked at the matter from the viewpoint of the minority stockholders," replied Mr. Hine. "I regarded it from the standpoint of 98 per cent of the stock."

## BRITISH CRUISER HAWKE SUNK IN NORTH SEA BY GERMAN SUBMARINE

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Oct. 16.—The British cruiser Hawke has been sunk in the North Sea by a German submarine. Out of a crew of 400 men fifty were saved. The admiralty today gave out the following announcement concerning the loss of the cruiser Hawke: "His Majesty's ship Thesus, Captain Hugh Edwards, was attacked by a submarine in the northern waters of the North Sea yesterday afternoon but was missed. His Majesty's ship Hawke, Captain H. P. T. E. Williams, was attacked and sunk. "The following officers with 69 men of the crew have been saved: Lieutenant Commander Rosman; Boatswain Sydney Austin; Gunner James Dennis; and acting Gunner Harry Evitt. "The remaining officers and men are missing. "The Hawke was a cruiser, built in 1889."

## BECOMING IMPATIENT OVER REFUSAL OF PRESS BUREAU TO RELEASE NEWS

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Oct. 9.—Englishmen are becoming very impatient over the refusal of the press bureau to release definite news of the fighting in France. Every day the papers are filled with complaints from indignant readers who are beginning to ridicule the judgment of the censors and demand frank statements of the actual happenings at the front. Verse makers have also begun to turn their ridicule upon the press bureau both through the daily papers and the comic papers. The English paper was slow to criticize the censorship but after two months of war newspaper readers say the press bureau should be in a position to keep up the spirits of an anxious country by advising it of results achieved by the army. A storm of protest against the general suppression policy of the censors is spreading over all England.

## SCHEME PROPOSED Through Which by Issuance of Bonds Cotton Situation Can be Cared For With Profit.

(By Associated Press.) RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 16.—Senator James H. Bankhead, of Alabama, before the mass meeting of the traders bodies of Raleigh, proposed a scheme through which by the issuance of \$20,000,000 of bonds by the State, the cotton situation may be cared for with a profit to the State. The plan looks to the reduction of the 1914 crop to the two-thirds proposition of present crop, by tax of 50 cents per bale and 25 cents per acre. The State will buy cotton at fifty dollars a bale to one-half of the crop, place it in warehouses and issue in payment non-interest bearing bonds of denominations in multiple of \$1,000. These bonds are to become interest-bearing at 4 per cent when collected in groups of \$10,000.

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
