BOOKS WILL CLOSE NEXT THURSDAY—VOTING MARCH 16TH

All Wards of the City Are Represented—Ward One Having the Most

One hundred and sixty-six electors have registered to date for the special municipal election to be held on March 16 on the question of the city of Anderson issuing bonds not exceeding the amount of \$100,000, to be used in the paving of streets under the new abutting property owners law.

The books of registration will close next Thursday, March 4, and the election will be held twelve days thereafter. The books are open daily, except Sunday, in the office of the supervisor of registration, T. P. Dickson, over the old postoffice building.

APPLICATION FOR BAIL MADE TODAY

ATTORNEY FOR FAIR PLAY MEN TO APPEAR BEFORE JUDGE GARY

AT ABBEVILLE

Motion Was to Have Been Argued at Pickens But Court Had Adjourned

Sam'l L. Prince, Esq., of the firm of Watkins & Prince, left yesterday afternoon for Abbeville, where he will appear this morning before Judge Frank B. Gary, in chambers, in application for bail for S. A. Jones, John McDonald and Will Kay, who are being held in Oconee county jail, at Walhalla, on charges of murder, it being alleged that they, among others, are responsible for the death of Green Gibson, who with two other negroes was killed during race rioting last December in the Fair Play section of Oconee county.

Attorneys Watkins & Prince of this city, and R. L. Herndon and J. F. Earle, of Walhalla, have been retained by the defendants. Mr. Herndon was to have appeared yesterday before Judge DeVore at Pickens, in application for bail for the three men under arrest. As court adjourned on Wednesday and Judge DeVore had left Pickens, this plan could not be carried out. Jones, McDonald and Kay were arrested Wednesday morning by Sheriff John Davis of Oconee county and carried to Walhalla, where they were placed in jail. The men waived right of preliminary hearing and decided to have their attorneys make application for bail at once. As generally known, six arrests have been made in connection with the race rioting at Fair Play on December 20 last. The other three defendants are W. C. McClure, Calvin Kay and Woodrow Campbell. They were arrested several weeks ago, and after spending several days in jail awaiting trial, were admitted to bail on \$10,000 each.

Three defendants have engaged the same attorneys as the three men arrested Wednesday, and it is probable that all cases will be tried together at the term of court convening at Walhalla next Monday.

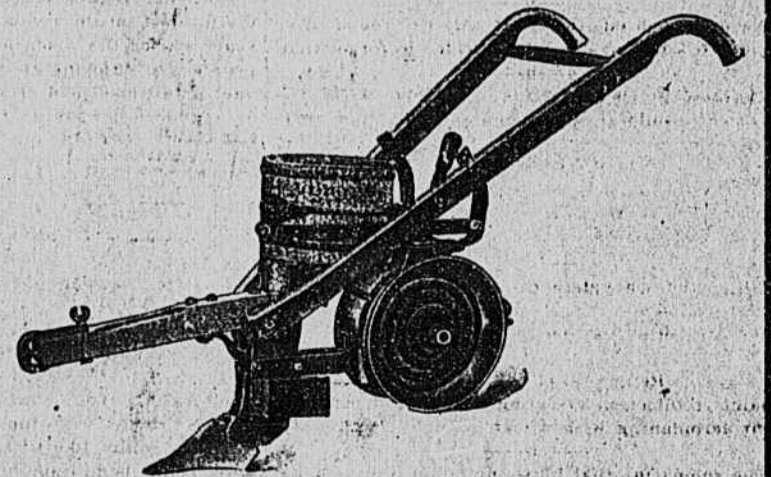
