CONTRACT LET FOR IMPROVING BASIN

W. W. JOHNSON WILL PUT
CEMENT LINING IN BIG
RESERVOIR

WORK STARTS SOON

Approximately 325 Cubic Yards
of Concrete Will be Put
Down—Cost \$2,500

The contract for cementing the basin of the Reservoir northwest of the city has been let by the Southern Public Utilities company to W. W. Johnson.

Preliminaries for carrying out the contract are under way already, and the actual work of pouring the concrete will begin about March 15. Approximately 325 cubic yards of concrete work will be necessary to line the bottom and sides of the reservoir. The improvements will cost approximately \$2,500.

Some time ago, it will be recalled, the Southern Public Utilities company's resident manager, Mr. H. A. Orr, announced that the company would build a new filter plant on Cox Creek and cement the bottom and sides of the reservoir northwest of the city. The new filter will be ready for use in a few days, and will double the supply of pure drinking water for the city.

SHOOTING SCRAPE SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Mordecai Garrett Shot Dora Donald—This is Second Woman He Has Shot

The wave of crime which broke out in Anderson last Saturday appears to have spread to remote parts of the county and to have continued over Sunday. In addition to reports of all the lawlessness that occurred in the city last week, came news yesterday of a shooting which occurred Sunday on the plantation of Mr. John Pruitt, near Starr.

It is reported that a negro named Mordecai Garrett shot a negro woman named Dora Donald. The woman was struck in the stomach and in the arm and her condition is considered serious. The shooting occurred about sundown Sunday. The negro made his escape. This is the second woman Garrett has shot. About a year ago he wounded a woman, the shooting occurring on Mr. Pruitt's plantation.

A warrant for the apprehension of the negro has been sworn out before Magistrate J. H. Rainey.

EXONERATED DEPUTY WHO KILLED NEGRO

Constable Ellis Hughes Not Blamed for Shooting Arthur Williams

Arthur Williams, the negro who was shot late Saturday night at his home near Donalds by Deputy Ellis Hughes, who accompanied Sheriff Ashley when he went to place the negro under arrest for a crime committed in Honea path several weeks ago, died of his injuries about 6 o'clock Sunday morning. Sunday afternoon an inquest was held by Magistrate J. C. Martin, the jury returning a verdict exonerating the deputy who shot the negro. Sheriff Ashley attended the inquest, as did the officer who fired the fatal shots. Arthur Williams had been wanted by the Anderson county authorities or some time. Several weeks ago the negro engaged in a pistol duel with Policemen Page and Hughes of Honea path because one of the officers seized a package of whiskey from another

negro. After shooting scrape Williams skipped out, and no more was heard of him until Sheriff Ashley was advised last Saturday that the negro was back at his home on Mr. B. L. Morrison's plantation near Donalds.

Late Saturday evening Sheriff Ashley, with Deputy Sheriff Sanders, left for Donalds to arrest Williams. Going through Honea Path, the sheriff picked up Policemen Page and Hughes and deputized a brother of the policeman, Mr. Ellis Hughes. When the posse went to arrest the negro, he put up a fight and was fatally shot by Deputy Ellis Hughes.
