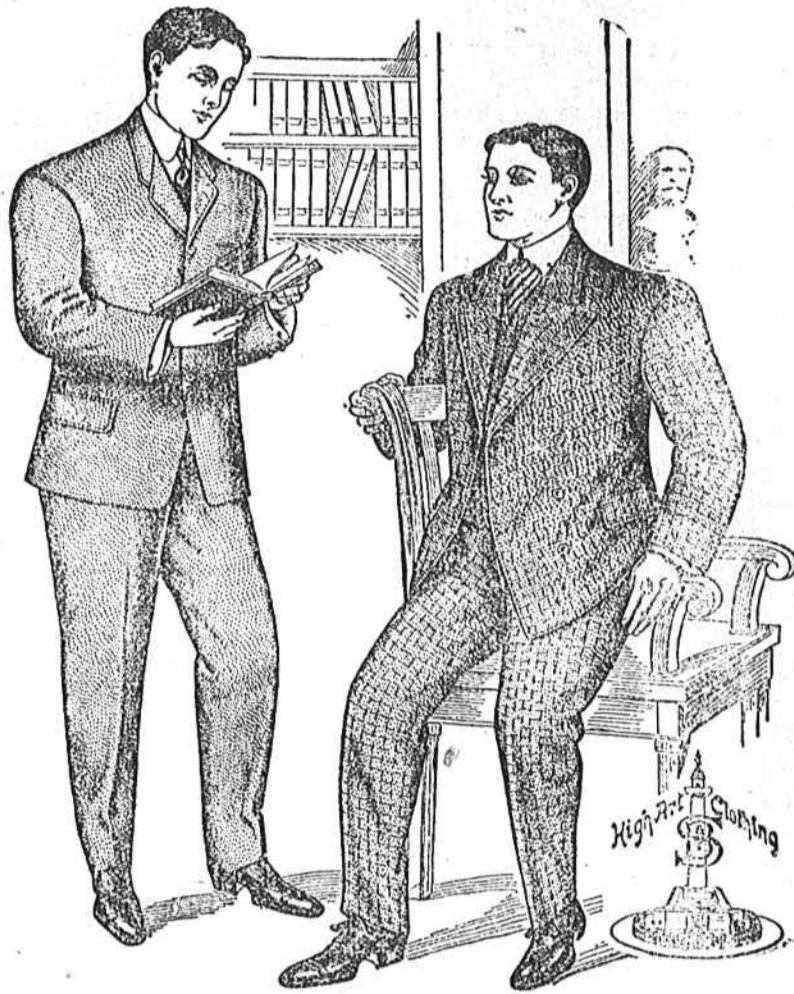

The Pickens Railway Company is to have a new locomotive, and old No. 1131, which has done duty on the little railway since it began operation ten years ago, will be put out of commission. It is understood that Engineer Jeanes will leave this morning for Atlanta, where he will make arrangements to return with the new engine recently purchased in that city. The history of old No. 1131 is interesting. The locomotive was one of the first lot of engines that ever pulled a coach on the Atlanta and Charlotte Air Line, and was used by the Southern until the Pickens railway became the owner. It is scarcely half the size and weight of the great engines used today and has gradually grown weaker and weaker as the years passed. The tank on the tender has become so badly worn that it refused to hold water, and superintendent Taylor has decided at last that a new engine is a necessity.—Greenville News.
